The Talent school district No. 22 held its annual meeting at the school house Monday afternoon. After the minutes the clerk's report was read and accepted, following which the election of a director and a clerk was in order. G. A. Morse was re-elected as director and E. B. Adamson was elected clerk. The meeting adjourned with William Beeson succeeding G. A. Morse as chairman of the board of directors.

The Parent-Teachers' association met at the schoolhouse Tuesday evening for their regular session. The attendance was rather limited, yet the program and discussion was very good.
