

AUTO COLLIDES WITH MOTORCYCLE TWO BADLY HURT

ASHLAND, June 28.—A frightful auto-cycle collision occurred Saturday night, about 11:20 in the vicinity of Frederick. The car was coming from Medford. Howard Frame of Talent was at the wheel and had for passengers Everett Heeson, also of Talent, and Pat Scott of Ashland. "Duff" Harrington was piloting the motorcycle, having in ballast Wright Hicks, both of Ashland. They were going towards Medford, each machine at a lively clip. The impact was simply terrific. Frame was dangerously injured about the head and lies at the Granite City hospital in an unconscious condition. Hicks had a leg broken and is at his home in this city. The others sustained minor injuries. The parties remained at the scene of the accident until C. V. Beeler of Ashland came along with his car and rendered assistance. Dr. Hart, of the county hospital, being summoned as first aid to the injured.

The automobile is an E. M. F., No. 19,658. It has been better days and had been rebuilt along the lines of a speeder. It was badly damaged. The motorcycle was a borrowed machine and was wrecked to the extent that it was simply gathered up in fragments. One of Dave Good's transfer wagons brought in what was left of both machines Sunday noon, and the remains may now be viewed at the Park garage.

Riders of the motorcycle state that the auto carried no lights and was on the wrong side of the road. Occupants of the car haven't been heard from on the subject and are evidently yet too dazed to tell how the accident happened.

traveled in these eleven runs was 855 miles. Altogether these cars traveled 9407 miles and the upkeep cost, including gasoline, oil, repairs, and depreciation of car and tires, was just fifty-seven one hundredths of a cent per mile. The lowest average of all was made here on the coast, at Los Angeles, where the car was run for but forty-nine one hundredths of a cent per mile.
