The hottest day of the year was Thursday, when the thermometer rose to 102 degrees. Wednesday it reached 101 degrees. At noon today the mercury stood at 98 degrees.

The heat is no balm to farmers and fruitgrowers and is retarding the normal growth of alfalfa. The heaviest use of city water for the season occurred Thursday afternoon and evening.

The fruit is well advanced, pears and apples larger than at the end of July a year ago, forecasting an early harvest.
