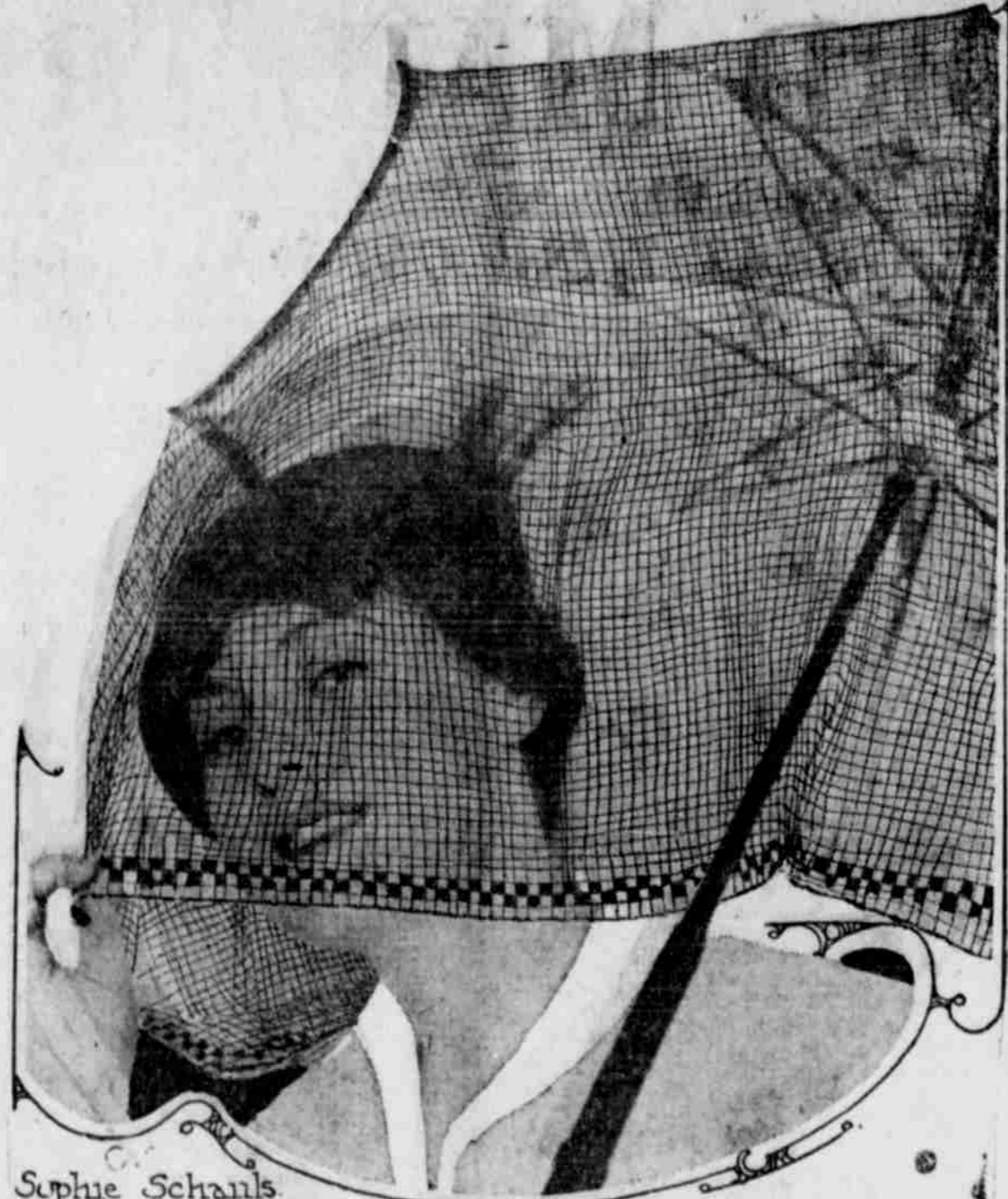

SEATTLE, Wa., July 14.—When the Liberty Bell arrived from Everett this morning companies of marines from the Puget Sound navy yard and soldiers from Fort Lawton, each with a band, were at the railroad station to guard the bell, which was switched to a spur track.

Mayor Gill welcomed the Philadelphians and Mayor Blankenburg of Philadelphia responded. The Philadelphians were taken for an automobile ride while patriotic exercises were held beside the bell, the multitude meantime filling the ancient relic. PROBE SCANDAL OF IOWA CRIMES

MEDFORD, Iowa, July 14.—Samuel Anderson, an aged pioneer, who was the cause of four of his neighbors being brought into court on charges of murder in connection with the so-called Slain murder and treasure chest case, was on the stand today at the hearing of Bates Huntsman before Justice M. A. Sawyer.

Anderson followed John A. McKenzie of Omaha on the witness stand and his evidence was expected to take up the greater part of the afternoon. The witness' story on the stand did not vary greatly from that which he told in public statements recently. He detailed his almost continuous efforts during the last twenty years to dig up a treasure chest on his farm which was the scene of the alleged murder and robbery of Nathaniel Smith, a Missouri cattleman, and his son, in 1877.

An important development of the day was when Mrs. Elizabeth Benson of Dover, Oklahoma, widow of Jonathan Dark, who is alleged to have figured in the farm murder and robbery case, told Attorney General Cameron that her sister, Mattie Collins McAllister, was acquitted of the murder of Jonathan Dark at Independence, Mo., on the plea of insanity.

Mrs. Benson is to take the stand

for the defense and will, it is said, deny the statements of her other sister, Mrs. Maria Collins Porter, the state's chief witness, made in the hearing last night and today.

FREDERICK SHARON OF PALACE HOTEL DEAD

SAN FRANCISCO, July 14.—Frederick Sharon, millionaire presi-

dent of the Palace Hotel company of this city, died today of a complication of diseases. He was 56 years old and a graduate of Harvard University in 1881.

Senator Francis G. Newlands of Nevada, a brother-in-law, was at the bedside with Mr. Sharon's wife and other relatives.
