

BULLIS MAY GO INTO DEVELOPMENT LUMBER INDUSTRY

"I never saw a community where the natural resources were so dominantly inefficiently managed," said S. S. Bullis, president of the Southern Oregon Traction company, trustee of the Sterling Mining company, and recent purchaser of the Barnum railroad today, whose faith in the Rogue river valley is attested to by the expenditure of large sums of money for development purposes, when the rest of the capitalists are "sitting tight."

"Here we are shipping box material and lumber from Weed and Eugene with great forests at our very door untouched. I don't want to go into the lumber business, but somebody ought to develop an untouched and valuable asset. All the lumber Medford uses could be made at home and furnish a payroll. Our rails go very near to timber back of Jacksonville. I'd like to be hauling some logs into Medford for a sawmill. I would like to hear a mill whistle blowing in the morning."

"It looks as if citizens of a progressive city like Medford would get together, and put a stop to spending money away from home to develop what we have at home."

BOOS BOOSTING FOR TRI-STATE ROADS MEETING

George E. Boos is here making an extensive trip through three states, working up interest and organizing for the big convention, at which several thousand members of the association are expected to be present at San Francisco, September 13 to 17, the date of the convention being changed to just one month later than previously announced.

A tremendous effort is now being made to interest the government in building roads through their districts in these three states wherever they have forest reserves or land of any kind, and especially where rural mail postal delivery exists. These roads are being advocated to give outlets to the various communities and sections to and from all government points. This is the largest organization of its kind west of the Mississippi river and Jackson county has almost 400 members in the association.

Mr. Boos is famed for his good roads boosting, and "lets get out of the mud" is his slogan. Wherever you meet Mr. Boos you are sure to hear good roads before you get away. Realizing the importance of good roads to any community, and especially now that the motor vehicles are taking such a prominent part in the business world, Mr. Boos is becoming more of an enthusiastic booster every day.

He expects to leave in a few days for northern point, and will cover the territory of Oregon and Washington, boosting for the convention at San Francisco and good roads at the same time. The convention has agreed to meet with the Pan-American Road congress, constituting the American Road Builders association and the American Highway association, correlating the meetings with the International Engineering congress and the American Society of Civil Engineers, the three combined associations having a membership of 60,000, and Mr. Boos looks for the biggest road congress ever held in the United States.

State department dispatches today announced that General Gonzales, with most of his army, had evacuated Mexico City yesterday, turning the government over to the civil authorities.
