RELIEF FOR FLOOD REFUGEES IN OHIO

COLUMBUS, O., July 21.—Relief for hundreds of persons marooned and destitute in the Hardin county marsh lands was planned today by state authorities and county officers at Kenton. The food supply of these marooned in the vicinity of Kenton was reported to be nearly exhausted and arrangements were made to remove those in peril and to send food to others.

Thousands of acres of marsh lands in Hardin and Allen counties are devoted to raising onions, potatoes and hemp and many men and boys from the counties of eastern Kentucky come to Ohio each summer to work in the onion fields.

JANE ADDAMS SEES NO HOPE OF PEACE

WASHINGTON, July 21.—President Wilson was told today by Miss Jane Addams, representing the Women's Peace Conference, which recently met at The Hague, that she saw no possibility for peace in Europe in the immediate future.

Accompanied by Miss Lillian D. Wald of New York, Miss Addams spent more than an hour with the president and gave him a detailed account of confidential talks she had with high officials in Europe. Afterward, she said, she had not tried to interpret the views of those officials, but had sought to give the president an inside view of the European situation as she had found it.

COOLER WEATHER SEEMS IN PROSPECT

Heat records of the year were equalled Tuesday when the mercury registered 102 degrees in mid-afternoon. The same mark was reached July 2. Wednesday at noon the temperature was 99 with prospects of a higher rise. Prospects are for cooler weather. An intermittent breeze blew from the north. The heat has caused the beginning of the annual exodus of Medford people to the hills. Several brush fires all under control were reported to the forest service. Campers are warned to strictly observe the rules of the wood regarding fires.

OPERATION FATAL TO C. S. MOORE OF KLAMATH FALLS

Charles Sumner Moore, of Klamath Falls, died July 20, at the Portland sanitarium, following a surgical operation of a few days ago. He was aged 58. Mr. Moore was born in Salem and attended the public schools there and later Williams University. His wife, who survives him, was formerly Mary Langelle, of the old pioneer family of Jacksonville, Ore. He also leaves two sons, John M. Moore and Charles S. Moore Jr. Mr. Moore was born in Marion county. In 1863 Mr. Moore went to the military post at the Klamath agency, where he was a clerk in the commissary department for three years, during which time he saved enough money to go into business for himself in Klamath Falls. Mr. Moore was county school superintendent in Klamath Falls for several terms, and was a member of the school board there for many years.

Mr. Moore was one of the best known politicians in the state of Oregon and played an important part in the development of southern and southeastern Oregon. He was judge of Klamath county a number of years and was state treasurer from 1898 to 1906, after which he retired to private life, taking the vice presidency of the First National bank in Klamath Falls. He and his brother, Rufus S. Moore, went to Klamath county in the early days and amassed a fortune in lumber and farm lands. They built the Klamath Railway, Light & Power plant, the Klamath sawmills, and were owners of several other large concerns in southern Oregon.

The session was the shortest in months, and lasted but half an hour.

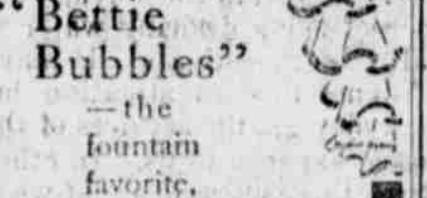
DRAMA LEAGUE TO MEET FRIDAY EVE
