ROOSEVELT'S SOPHISTRY.

AN interesting comparison might be made between the remarks of Colonel Roosevelt in behalf of war preparations and the Sermon on the Mount. Roosevelt's arguments are the same as those of the German militarists.

Whatever a nation plans for and prepares for it receives. Whatever is sown is reaped. War is a violation of the fundamental principles of Christianity and nearly every other great religion. Preparation for war is an equal violation.

Roosevelt's arguments on the need of war preparation would apply to Canada, with 3000 miles of unprotected frontier—yet for a century peace has existed without a soldier to guard the boundary of either nation.

Preparation to prevent war never yet averted war, but rather produced it. Neutral countries surrounded by enemies have a difficult task to maintain their equilibrium, but the United States is isolated, with an ocean of water on each side and no powerful enemies.

It is as easy for a nation to keep peace "with honor" as it is for a nation to surrender "with honor." To cry against European militarism and at the same time demand a big navy and army only for the purpose of defense, is to use the only argument ever made by the militarists of Europe.

American militarists constantly point to Belgium and Switzerland as examples of what happens to the military prepared nation and the unprepared. We are told that Belgium was unprepared, hence had her neutrality violated, while Switzerland was prepared and has been left alone.

The facts of the matter are that Belgium was as much prepared for war as Switzerland. She had a comparatively large army, numerous modern fortresses and could have successfully resisted an enemy of her own size. But she was overwhelmed by the German flood.

To be sure, the over-running of barren and mountainous Switzerland would be a more difficult task, than the devastation of level and fertile Belgium, but the final result would have been the same. What Britain, France and Russia have failed to halt, could little Switzerland have blocked?

Belgium would be just as well off, in fact better off, if she had saved the millions squandered on army and fortresses. Switzerland would be just as free if she was not bankrupting herself in maintaining a huge soldiery to protect her neutrality.

It has been well said that the peace idea necessitates voluntary humility, not forced humility, which is humiliation. The voluntary principle constitutes the radical difference between humility and humiliation.

Armed for war, inevitably creates desire for war. Soldiers yearn to practise their profession. The people, conscious of military strength long for a test of that strength. Having less humility, the nation becomes more aggressive and more restive when relations become strained.

Europe today is the answer to the argument of armament for defense. It is Roosevelt's logic carried to its inevitable conclusion.

WORK FOR PEACE SAYS JANE ADDAMS

CHICAGO, July 22.—Miss Jane Addams, who returned here today from her European mission said: "I come back convinced more than ever before that we must continue to plan, think, talk and act toward peace in Europe. The fighters are not ready at this moment to stop, but there is a growing spirit of unrest and irritation in all the countries at the usurpation of all civil functions by the military and the time must come when this sentiment will be big enough to make itself felt and force peace. We can help it, and we must help it. It may come all at once in all the countries. We must do what we can to hasten its coming."

The signing of the ten peace songs selected for all creeds and nationalities by the National Choral Peace Jubilee committee will be a feature of the mass meeting planned for tonight at which Miss Addams will be formerly welcomed. Yesterday she conferred with President Wilson in Washington.

BATTLE OF NAGO TREATY VIOLATION

WASHINGTON, July 22.—Secretary Lansing announced today that the state department was investigating whether the attack of Carranza forces at Nago and the fighting which followed were a violation of the agreement, both Carranza and Villa factions had made with Major General Scott, chief of staff of the army, for a neutral zone on the border to obviate danger to non-combatants.

Red Cross officials have asked for a conference with President Wilson on the seriousness of the situation in getting relief into Mexico. No communications came through today from Mexico City, now again in possession of the Zapata forces.

WHEN TO SPRAY FOR SECOND BROOD CODLING MOTHS

Many inquiries have come to this office in regard to the proper time to apply the spray for the second brood of codling moth. According to numerous observations made at various points of the valley, the first worms should make their appearance about July 28th, the first adult moths having emerged near Medford on July 16th. The larger number of worms will appear several days to a week later.

Seasonal Development When the worms of the first brood are full grown, they leave the fruit, crawl down to the trunk or crotch of the tree, and there under the loose bark find a protected nook where they hollow out a little place, spin a covering or cocoon, and change to the pupal or resting stage. About two weeks later the adult moths emerge from these cocoons. In about five days after the moths emerge they begin to lay their eggs. Under our present weather conditions the eggs will hatch in about seven days.

There are still quite a number of worms, at various stages of development, which have not yet left the fruit, and many which have not yet pupated. These will cause a struggling appearance of worms, probably throughout the remainder of the season. In order, therefore, to keep the fruit entirely free from late attacks, it will be necessary to keep it covered with spray.

Use lead arsenate, four pounds of the paste or two pounds of the powder to 100 gallons of water.

CHRISTIANS ORDERED TO LEAVE BY TURKS

PARIS, via London, July 22.—A Havas despatch from Athens says: "Turkish military authorities, according to advices from Vurla (a port in Smyrna on the Gulf of Smyrna) have ordered all Christian women and children to leave the town and go into the interior. Many of the residents refused to obey the order and a fierce struggle followed in which many were killed. "Some of the newspapers are urging the government to assume an energetic policy in dealing with Turkey."
