

ENGLAND'S FATE RESTS ON COAL MINERS WARNED

Lloyd George at Conference of Union Labor in Speech Describes Fuel as One Product Upon Which Victory for Allies Lies—May Pay Terrific Price.

LONDON, July 29.—Twenty-five hundred coal operators and representatives of the miners' union packed the London opera house today at a national conference, called by the government prior to the recent strike in Wales, to give impetus to the coal supply.

The chief speakers for the government were Sir John A. Simon, secretary for home affairs, and David Lloyd-George, minister of munitions. "Coal," said the latter, "means life for us and death for our foes. Steam means coal, rifles mean coal, shells are filled with coal, the very explosive inside them is coal, and coal carries them right on to the battle field to help our men. Coal is everything to us and we want more of it to win the victory."

Referring to the recent British casualty list of 350,000 officers and men, Mr. Lloyd-George said all these were victims of German coal "produced by the West Phelan miner working in co-operation with the Prussian engineer without reserve and regulation."

The British navy which drove the German flag from the seas, he pointed out, owed its strength to coal. The speaker said there were two schools—optimists and pessimists—but he believed in looking things straight in the face.

Lloyd-George continued:

"Events in the east, whatever they portend, mean that we must put forth all our strength. They mean that a larger share than ever of the burden of this struggle is to be on the shoulders of Great Britain. Do not shrink from it. We must pay the price of victory if we mean to get it. The peril our country faces is great, the demand for coal is great and the supply of labor has dimin-

BERLIN TELLS OF REPULSES FOR FOES BOTH LINES

BERLIN, via London, July 29.—German army headquarters today gave out a statement on the progress of hostilities as follows:

"In Flanders our artillery yesterday destroyed a pontoon over the Furnes canal on which a heavy gun had been mounted.

"To the west of Souchez a French attack was repulsed.

"Near Givenchy in the Argennes and near Vanquois we successfully blew up mines. French mine explosions in the Champagne district were without result.

"In the eastern theater of the war the situation north of the river Niemen remains unchanged. To the northeast of Kuwalki, along both sides of the railroad to Ollta, our troops have occupied a portion of the enemy position, capturing 2999 prisoners and two machine guns.

"Last night the Russians delivered repeated attacks against our front south of the river Narew south of Nasielsk. All the endeavors failed with heavy losses to the enemy. To the west of Novogeorgievsk, on the south bank of the Vistula, we captured 128 Russians.

"In the district to the southwest of Gorakalwarja Russian forces on the night of July 27 attempted to advance in a westerly direction. Yesterday we attacked them and drove them back.

"In the southeastern theater of the war the situation is generally regarded as unchanged."

Canadian Troops Arrive.

ST. JOHNS, N. B., July 29.—The steamships Hesperian and Herschel, carrying three regiments of Canadian mounted rifles, numbering 1800 men and 450 horses on their way to join the British forces in the field, have arrived safely at Plymouth, England, according to cable despatches received today. The men were sent out from Quebec.

JAP MINISTER RESIGNS UNDER BRIBERY CLOUD

TOKIO, July 29.—Viscount Kan-etha Oura, the Japanese minister of justice suddenly resigned his portfolio today. The minister's action, following as it does, the investigation instituted by the minister of justice into the bribery charges growing out of the parliamentary elections last March, caused a sensation throughout Japan.

The case involves several members and ex-members of the imperial diet, Count Shigenbu Okuma, the premier, reported the situation to Emperor Yoshihito, who sanctioned the resignation of Viscount Oura.

The investigation into the charges of bribery growing out of the March elections resulted in the arrest yesterday of K. Hayashida, who has been chief secretary of the lower house for twenty years. The arrest of Hayashida is said to be connected with the charge against Viscount Oura, who is alleged to have received a present of \$500 from a candidate for membership in the house.

REVIVAL PUGILISM ANDREW'S PLAN

CHICAGO, July 29.—Arrangements have been completed for a meeting at Cleveland on August 21 and 22 for the formation of an association to control boxing over all the world, it was announced today. The initiative in the move has been taken by Tom Andrews, who believes most of the racketeers in the country will attend this session and formulate iron-clad rules under which the sport can be conducted. Andrews has issued a circular in which he says he has had reports from nearly all the big clubs of the country, and that everyone has promised to send a representative. He has been in communication with clubs in Europe and Australia and says they have written that they are heartily in favor of the organization.

SHEPHERD-BANDIT GETS LONG TERM

BOISE, Idaho, July 29.—Leon Denn, the sheep-herder who kidnapped Ernest A. Empey and held him prisoner in the mountains in Eastern Idaho for six days demanding payment of a \$6000 ransom, was put in the Idaho penitentiary today to serve an indeterminate sentence of from one to ten years. He pleaded guilty to the charge in the district court of Bingham county at Blackfoot.

TIE CORPORATIONS SUIT ON STOCKS HELD NOT VALID

The Metallic Tie company, a Utah corporation, which has sold considerable of its stock in Jackson county, and which has never complied with the corporation laws of Oregon, is now making demands upon some of the Jackson county subscribers for payment upon assessable stock bought by local citizens. The statement made by this corporation to the corporation commissioner of the state was so unsatisfactory that no permit was granted by that department to do business within the state and stock sales made by them since the enactment of the Blue Sky law are in violation of the law and as I view the matter the company cannot lawfully collect on its assessments. I examined the statements submitted by the corporation commissioner and of the opinion that the whole scheme was purely a blue sky promotion dodge and I advise the citizens of Jackson county who have been threatened with legal proceedings for non-payment of assessments to not be frightened by threats of suit, as this concern has no capacity to sue in this state.
