

FOREIGNERS AIDED STRIKE PROMOTION DECLARES GOMPERS

WASHINGTON, July 30.—President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor today reiterated his charge that foreign influences had been working to make strikes in the United States and called upon the working men to discountenance any such attempts. Mr. Gompers made public his correspondence with the Central Federated Union of New York, which made an inquiry regarding a statement attributed to Mr. Gompers that "officers of international unions had received money to pull off strikes in Bridgeport and elsewhere in ammunition factories."

"I never mentioned international unions," wrote Mr. Gompers, "nor did I use the word German nor did I mention Bridgeport nor did I refer to ammunition factories. What I did say was that authentic information had come to me that efforts had been made to corrupt men for the purpose of having strikes inaugurated among seamen and longshoremen engaged in handling American products and manning ships for European ports; that the corrupting influence was being conducted by agents of a foreign government and that I had not doubt the same agencies and influences were at work elsewhere with the same purpose in view."

"That the effort has been made to corrupt some of our men for such a purpose is true, but that the strikes have been inaugurated is untrue and it is untrue because the men who give time and service to the workers of our country have interposed in time."

NATION WIDE DRY MOVEMENT

NEW YORK, July 30.—Plans were announced today by Albert R. Rogers, director of the National Abolitioners Union for a nation-wide temperance movement in which it proposed to expend \$100,000 during the first year. Moving pictures are expected to be a powerful adjunct with the work and traveling exhibitors will be sent out to present them.

The movement is an outgrowth of plans of the Churches of Christ in America representing 30 denominations with a communicant membership of 17,500,000 persons.

TIES DELIVERED ON GRANTS PASS ROAD

Ties are now being delivered along the right-of-way between Wilderville and Hays Hill, and the full number required for the work will undoubtedly be on hand as soon as the grading contract is completed. A rush order for the rails to lay the first one and one half miles of track beyond Wilderville was sent in this morning, as it is now proposed to lay this much steel without waiting for the completion of the grading of the unit. By laying this much of the track at once work beyond will be much facilitated. The one and one-half miles will take the track to Hair's Prairie, across Slate creek, and if there is no cause for delay in shipment of the rails from Portland they should be here during the next week. The grade will be ready to receive them, with the ties on the right-of-way.—Grants Pass Courier.

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PEAR MARKET UNSATISFACTORY

First full carload of northwest Bartlett pears for the season is due to arrive in the Portland market early in the coming week. The shipment has just been ordered from North Yakima.

While the Bartlett pear market to date this season has been very unsatisfactory to the local trade and prices have tended lower with a curtailed demand, the trade is inclined to believe that with the opening of the northwest season by the arrival of the Yakima car, the situation so far as the movement is concerned, will improve.

California pears have been very unsatisfactory as regards quality. The fruit has not held up well. As soon as it was removed from cold cars it began to drop in quality. There was practically no call at all for unripened fruit and when the ripened stage was reached, decay began to set in too fast for successful movement.

Sales of California Bartletts are reported along the street today at \$1.50 generally for best quality offerings.

WARN DEER HUNTERS NOT TO RUSH SEASON

Carl D. Shoemaker, state game warden, has issued a bulletin warning the public that the deer hunting season does not open until August 15. Mr. Shoemaker says:

"The state game warden is very anxious to give all the publicity possible to the fact that the deer hunting season this year does not open until August 15, which is 15 days later than has been customary for many years. It is unlawful to hunt deer in Oregon until that time. The season closes on October 31."

"This change in the law should be borne in mind, otherwise some hunter may be found unintentionally violating the law, and subjecting himself to a heavy fine. The state game warden's office would rather prevent law violations than make an arrest. The game laws, however, must be rigidly enforced."

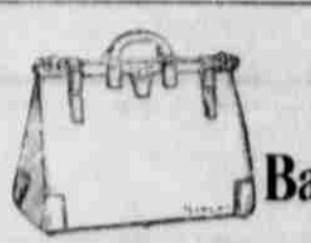
