**RAINFALL DEFICIT
 FOR SEASON NOW
 TOTALS ONE FOOT**

The seasonal rainfall deficit for the season (since September 1) in the Rogue river valley to date according to the monthly weather report is one foot. The total precipitation for July is .30 inches. The average rainfall for the month is .28 inches. Last year no rain fell in August and official records show that it is generally the driest month of the year. The heaviest precipitation last month was on the 6th when .22 of an inch fell. The heat record for the season was set on the 23rd when the mercury rose to 104 degrees, a degree lower than the hottest day of last year when it was 105 degrees. The minimum temperature was 42 degrees on the 17th. The greatest daily range was 49 degrees. The weather freak of the month was a wind and thunder-storm on July 4. There were seven clear, 20 partly cloudy, and four cloudy days during the month. The report is as follows:

**TROUT FRY FOR
 UPPER ROGUE NOW
 READY TO PLANT**

The Medford Rod and Gun club has received the following notice from F. M. Warren of the state fish and game commission:

"I am advised from the govern-
 ment office in Seattle that at the
 present time the total amount of fish
 available at the Elk Creek hatchery
 amounts to approximately 23,000 cut
 throats and 53,000 steelheads or
 rainbow. These would all be avail-
 able for planting in the Rogue river
 and are subject to your disposition.
 "I would suggest that you get in
 touch with the hatchery superintend-
 ent and arrange to take these out as
 early as possible. I understand that
 it is your idea to take the entire lot
 to the north fork above the falls.
 "In connection with the work on
 the Rogue river would call your at-
 tention to the fact that this season
 the government reports the taking of
 a trillion and a half steelhead eggs
 at the Trail hatchery and four mil-
 lion at Applegate, total of 5,500,000
 eggs, all of which have been liberat-
 ed in the Rogue river with the excep-
 tion of the amounts which I have men-
 tioned as now available. This ap-
 pears to be a bumper year for the
 hatcheries in your district and should
 be productive of great results in the
 future.

"In addition to what the Rogue
 river has furnished on its own ac-
 count, we hope to ship in steelheads
 from the Bonneville central station.
 In fact, the car is now loading a con-
 signment for Grants Pass.
 "At any time that you may have
 any suggestions to make as to han-
 dling of matters in your vicinity would
 be greatly pleased to hear from you."
 In this connection, it can be stated
 that fewer steelhead were kept at the
 hatchery until they reached the fish-
 ering stage than for several years
 recently, due to low water.

**BRYANS ADVERTISE
 CRATER LAKE IN
 PORTLAND SPEECHES**

Wm. J. Bryan and Mrs. Bryan are giving Crater Lake wide publicity in their speeches. The Oregonian quotes them as follows at Portland:

There was one subject upon which the ex-secretary of state talked with freedom and enthusiasm; however, and that was the beauties and wonders of Crater Lake.

On his recent visit to Medford he and Mrs. Bryan were the guests of the Medford Commercial club on a visit to Crater Lake.

"I never saw a more inspiring sight," he exclaimed in telling of his impressions last night. "It is truly wonderful. And it is a pity that a place of such rare natural beauty should remain so inaccessible, comparatively speaking."

"Give Crater Lake adequate transportation facilities and good roads, and it will be impossible to keep tourists away."

Mr. Bryan took occasion here to announce his firm belief in the good roads movement and declared that there should be no objection to federal aid in building a road to Crater Lake National Park.

Mrs. Bryan in her speech before the Equal Suffrage club referred briefly to her recent trip with Mr. Bryan to the California expositions and to Crater Lake. She expressed her delight at the things she saw in California, but was moved even to greater enthusiasm in her praise of the beauty and the wonders of Crater Lake.

**RECOMMENCE WORK
 FEDERAL BUILDING**

Work began this morning upon the second story of the new federal building on Sixth and Holly streets. Two carloads of stone from Auburn, Wash., were received this morning for this part of the work. The steel work for the third story has been erected. No further delay in the receipt of material is anticipated.

Following the protest of citizens that workers were waking them at 4 a. m., the men have resumed the regular shifts again. During the hot weather they began their toil at 5 o'clock, and the sound of breaking bricks and hammering disturbed folks living nearby.

It is now expected to have the building completed by January 1, 1916. The treasury department contract calls for the completion of the building ready for occupancy by May 1, so this will leave four months for the carpenters and painters to put on the finishing touches. Entire new fixtures will be installed in the building.

**FISHERMEN TRY
 TO BURN CANNERY
 AT RIVER'S MOUTH**

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Aug. 1.—Attempts to burn the cannery owned by the Macleay estate on the Rogue river, cutting off fishing nets and pouring acid on them, destruction of crops and fences and the killing of cattle and sheep on the Macleay range led to the issuing of a citation by Judge John S. Coke, of the Coos and Curry county circuit court for nine men from Gold Beach and Wedderburn to appear in Coquille, Wednesday, August 4, and show cause why they should not be fined for contempt of court.

R. L. Macleay of Portland, manager of the estate, charges that the men have violated the injunction issued last month restraining them from trespassing on the property. The cause of the growing feud is the rivalry among fishermen on the Lower Rogue river about Gold Beach and Wedderburn. The Macleay estate owns both banks of the river for 12 miles from its mouth. Mr. Macleay accuses the fishermen of using his land for drawing seines, despite the order issued by the court.

Several men arrested recently and tried at Gold Beach were dismissed without punishment. Mr. Macleay then removed the legal proceedings to Coos county. Mr. Macleay declared he might conclude to appeal to Governor Withycombe for protection.

The men cited to appear are A. D. Winegar, Charles Wilson, William Hunter, Alex McLeod, William Ask, A. R. Conger, J. C. Leclair, Frank Howe and W. P. Spencer. All are fishermen employed by the Seabury cannery.

The requirement of the accused fishermen to appear in Coquille at this particular time is embarrassing, as the fishing season is at its height and most of them are just beginning to make good catches. Mr. Macleay has engaged four watchmen, but they are unable to guard the entire holdings, and the law violations, he declares, continue without interruption.
