AUSTRALIAN BAND TO PROVIDE TREAT FOR LOCAL PEOPLE

The coming of the Australian student band will be a treat for the people of the city. They are endorsed by the Commercial club and places for them in the homes of the city have been secured by the club. They will arrive at 8:20 a. m. Friday.

After lunch the boys will be guests at the Natatorium during the afternoon. The boys are all good swimmers and among them is Otto Stenberg, the champion swimmer of the state of Western Australia.

All persons interested in swimming are especially invited to the Natatorium both on Friday and Saturday afternoon between 2 and 4 p. m. to gain points relative to swimming and water sports. No charge for admission to the building on these two afternoons.

On Friday and Saturday evenings at 8:00 o'clock the Australian boys will give a band concert and vaudeville entertainment that has delighted all parts of California where they have visited. On these occasions a nominal price of 25 cents will be charged for admission to the Natatorium. It might be added that on Saturday evening all lovers of dancing will have an opportunity of practicing this art to the music of a 12-piece orchestra furnished by the stars of the Australian boys.

Warsaw Falls to Germans. Krupp Toolers on Strike Sent to Eastern Front.

GENEVA, Aug. 5.—Advices from Essen say that all the demands of the employees of the Krupp works have been granted and that serious strike has thus been averted.

The city which the Teutonic forces have taken, lies on the Vistula, 625 miles southwest of Petrograd and 320 miles east of Berlin. It is an important industrial center and its population is estimated at 900,000.

trians to inflict smashing blows upon the Russians from this direction. Step by step, the Austro-German hosts pounded their way toward the city from the north and the south, while on the west, activities along the line of entrenchments that had so long held off the Germans in that section were resumed.

Before the power of the Teutons engaged in this encircling movement the armies of Grand Duke Nicholas began to fall back.

Pzrasnycz to the north of Warsaw was occupied and the German armies swept on. By July 19 they had forced the Russians back to the line of the Narew river and pushed their way to within 20 miles of their goal.

The fortress of Ostrolenka was taken and the Nowogrobnick fortification, the key to Warsaw on the north, was approached. To the south Radom was occupied and the Russian lines of communication in the Lublin region threatened.

Tighten Around Capital. Then began a tightening of the German lines around the capital. The Teutons forced their way past the Blonie line, southwest of the city, pushed their way across the river Narew, below Ostrolenka and the battering at the fortified gates of the city started in earnest on Tuesday of this week by Bavarian troops under command of Prince Leopold of Bavaria.

In East Prussia on the north and in Galicia on the south, the Russian armies began to push forward. Twice in East Prussia they were swept back, but before last winter set in, they had succeeded in pressing their way through Galicia and were near Cracow, which is almost directly on a line south of the Polish capital.

Plan of Campaign. In the spring, however, after Premysl had fallen into their hands and the victorious Russian armies were threatening the German border and an invasion of Hungary, came the organized Austro-German movement which recaptured the great Austrian fortress and swept the Russian lines back farther east in some sections that they had been in early in the war.

The Warsaw salient, thus exposed hazardously from the south, was additionally threatened by the German advance in the Baltic provinces which acted not only as a supporting movement to the flank attack on Warsaw, but threatened to cut off the retreat of the Russian armies.

Previous Drives on City. The first determined drive against Warsaw from the west occurred last October. Within a short time the German advance guards penetrated to within 19 miles of the city, over which German aeroplanes and Zeppelins flew. The Russians moved troops hastily from Galicia and Warsaw slipped from his hands of the Germans.

Shortly afterward a second attempt was launched and gathered force until a great battle developed along the rivers Warta and Vistula. The Germans at first were victorious successful but the fighting turned in favor of the Russians. They cut off and apparently surrounded two German corps, who bravely managed to cut their way out.

February Attempt. Another attempt at Warsaw occurred in February after the Russians had for the second time been driven out of East Prussia. This time the attack came from the north and Field Marshal Von Hindenburg's forces, reached and captured Pzrasnycz with 10,000 prisoners on February 25. Three days later, however, the Russians recaptured it and put the Germans on the defensive.

Hammering along this line and at other sections south and west from the East Prussian frontier continued for months, but not until the inception of the present campaign was there anywhere a serious break in the Russian defenses.

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The British board of trade report for July shows that 62 British steamers and sailing craft were sunk by the Germans during the month, with a loss of 63 lives, while four steamers and 19 lives were lost by mines.

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the senate committee on military affairs, each voiced the opinion here today that an extra session of congress to provide for the national defense was unnecessary and inadvisable at this time.

The question arose when Senator Chamberlain called upon Senator Tillman, who has just returned from a trip to Alaska. They agreed that steps to strengthen measurably the army and navy should be taken by congress at the regular session, but thought need for action prior to that time did not exist.

As chairman of the naval affairs committee" said Senator Tillman, "I shall support a program for making our navy as good as the best. I did not favor more battleships at the last session because recent developments seem to indicate that battleships are liable to become obsolete. I favor plenty of submarines and fast cruisers and whatever else we need to put our navy on the most effective footing."

Senator Tillman declared he would favor making the Bremerton, Wash., navy yard the equal in importance and capacity of the Brooklyn navy yard.
