

BUMPING NOSES NO INDICATION OF MARTIAL INFIDELITY

In findings handed down this morning by Judge F. M. Calkins of the circuit court in the divorce suit of C. V. Cummings against Mattie Cummings of Medford the spirit of Europe enters. Referring to the time when Cummings alleged that his wife and mother-in-law, broke down the door of his home with an axe, and forced him to flee from a bath with his clothes in his arms to the backyard, the court observes:

"The plaintiff can console himself that he put up a good defense but was outclassed in munitions and numbers, and the defendant can console herself with the victory."

The court ordered that a decree in favor of the plaintiff be prepared by the attorneys.

The findings, delceted from the evidence shows a stormy matrimonial campaign. It holds the plaintiff Cummings to be "calm and deliberate, and either truthful or an excellent actor." Mrs. Cummings the findings hold to be "insanely jealous," "morbid," and highly imaginative with inclinations "to view her suspicions darkly." The companionship of the Cummings is compared "to a sultry summer day—sunshine and electrical storms." Quarrels were frequent in the Cummings' household.

The evidence the court held showed that when ever domestic troubles rasee Mrs. Cummings "flew to male arms, this being shown in the two incidents of Morgan and Heitshue." The records show that Mrs. Cummings after each separation sought reconciliation with Cummings.

The climax in the case came when Cummings hired a Mrs. Jones to be his housekeeper. Mrs. Cummings, gazing through the window saw her husband and housekeeper "bumping noses." The court holds this to be "silly fooling" but with no evidence of any infidelity. The 11-year-old daughter of Mrs. Jones explained that she was seated upon her mother's lap, engaged in this pastime, and that she asked that "Mama and Mr. Cummings bump noses." The evidence showed that the suggestion was followed out. The court holds that there is no evidence to support Mrs. Cummings' allegations of unfaithfulness.

Reference is made to Mrs. Cummings' affair with one Heitshue. Upon finding that he was married and not divorced she left him. The evidence showed that Cummings maintained quarters for a former wife in Salt Lake City, but that this was only for the purpose of being able to see his boy.

The case was replete with sensational allegations and incidents.

VILLA EXECUTES STATE TREASURER

EL PASO, Texas, Aug. 6.—Arrivals from Chihuahua City today declared that Sebastian Vargas, Jr., state treasurer of Chihuahua, was executed Wednesday on orders from General Villa.

According to Villa officers who are responsible for the report, Vargas, with Sylvestro Terrazas, secretary of the state government, left the capital with their families in automobiles for the border. At Montezuma, 90 miles south of Juarez, they were arrested on orders of General Villa, it was said, and returned to the capital. There Vargas was executed. The fate of Terrazas was not reported.

Reports from Columbus, N. M., today indicate the quelling of the latest faction in Northwestern Chihuahua which resulted recently in the revolt of the Villa garrison of Palomas, Casas Grande and Acencion. It is said a Villa force arriving from Guzman reconquered Palomas.

MEXICANS KILL THREE AMERICANS ON TEXAS BORDER

BROWNSVILLE, Tex., Aug. 6.—Mexican outlaws today raided the village of Sebastian, 27 miles north of here, killing two men and a woman. United States cavalrymen from Harlingen, 12 miles distant, have gone to Sebastian.

Fifteen rangers and armed men started from nearby points for Sebastian and practically every man in Harlingen armed himself preparing to hunt for the outlaws.

The dead are: A. L. Austin, president of the Sebastian Law and Order league, his wife and son Charles.

The league recently forced several men of bad reputation to leave Sebastian, which is little more than a cross roads. About 8:30 this morning Austin and his son were running a corn sheller when armed Mexicans galloped up, taking both into the brush nearby. There they were killed.

Yesterday a band of Mexicans raided a ranch in the Sebastian section, stealing five saddle horses, two saddles, two rifles and a pistol. They got the drop on some cowboys on the ranch, keeping them covered with pistols for an hour.

A Sebastian storekeeper named Alexander said that there were twelve mounted armed men in the party. All of them appeared to be Mexicans of middle age. They robbed the store.

ALLIES TRY TO ENLIST BALKANS

NISH, Serbia, Aug. 6.—Another step in the effort being made to bring about a Balkan agreement so that Bulgaria, Romania and Greece may be mustered on the side of the entente powers, was taken here today by the ministers of Russia, Great Britain, France and Italy, who made collective representations to Nikola Patsch, the Serbian premier.

An official communication issued in this connection today said the ministers' representations were of the friendliest character and were made in the hope of avoiding friction between the Balkan states and in establishing an entente between them, thus bringing nearer the final success of the allies in the war.

ARMED MEN HUNT NEGRO RAVISHER

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 6.—A section seven miles square in the southwest corner of Clay county, across the Missouri river north from here, is surrounded by five hundred armed men today in the search for a negro who yesterday attacked Mrs. Henry Stafford, wife of a young farmer near Liberty, Mo.

Work has begun on the Valley and Siletz railroad from Airlie to Independence.

BOY BURGLARS CONFESS ROBBERY OF JONES' HOME

James and Jesse Wilson, supposed to be brothers, and Frank Brown, arrested in this city a month ago on suspicion of robbing the home of Mrs. Lou D. Jones on Roosevelt avenue, and released because of incomplete identification and insufficient evidence, are held at Auburn, California, following an attempt to break jail, and a confession by James Wilson, a 14-year old boy. Jesse Wilson's name is R. E. Ford. Pictures of the trio appeared in the Sacramento Bee, leaving no doubt as to their identity as the men arrested in this city. According to the young boy's story his pals were ex-convicts, and forced him to act as a "stall" for their operations. The loot gathered in this city, including the jewelry from the Jones home was turned over to an accomplice, who expressed it to Reno, Nevada, where it has been recovered.

The trio were arrested by Deputy Sheriff Wilson on the Pacific highway near Ashland, upon information furnished by Thomas Scantlin. They were identified by Mrs. Claud Miles, Mrs. Ed G. Brown and other women as the men loitering about the Jones home on the afternoon of the crime. Mrs. E. E. Kelly who saw the burglars leave the Jones home could give no positive identification.

After their arrest the gang was given a hearing before Justice Taylor and told a plausible story. The evidence was all circumstantial and the court in dismissing them administered a severe lecture.

HOOD RIVER SELLS 100,000 BOXES APPLES

PORTLAND, Aug. 6.—The largest contract for the purchase of apples of this season, it became known today, has just been closed with Hood River growers, who have sold to O. Berghuis-Krak, The Netherlands consul here 100,000 boxes. The price paid was \$1.50 per box. The apples will be shipped to merchants in The Netherlands next October.
