Newtown apples, three inches in diameter are being shown from the Hanley orchard which is leased and operated by L. D. Harris. The orchard is the show place of the valley this season, many of the trees carrying forty boxes, and the quality of the fruit averaging high, the result of scientific care and irrigation. The high yield and price records made in 1907 and 1908 by the Bear Creek orchard, were secured under the management of L. D. Harris and he promises to duplicate his former success. 31,500 TROUT FRY PLANTED IN LOCAL STREAMS

The state game commission through Game Warden Diggsell and the co-operation of local anglers, has distributed 31,500 steelhead spawn in Rogue river valley streams, the place of distribution, number of cans and number of fish being as follows:

In the north fork of the Rogue near Woodruff Meadows, 78 cans totaling 19,500 fish.

In Rogue river near Plongee Rock bridge, 20 cans, totaling 5000 fish.

In Mill creek, 3 cans totaling 750 fish.

In the middle fork of the Rogue three cans totaling 750 fish.

In Rogue river near the electric power station, 4 cans totaling 1000 fish.

In the private pond of Edward Judy, one can of 250 fish.

In the Applegate, 12 cans totaling 5000 fish.

In the Applegate near the Nowbury and Cantrell ranch, three cans totaling 1250 fish.

AIRSHIPS BOMBARD TOWN NEAR SMYRNA

PARIS, Aug. 12.—A dispatch to the Havas agency from Athens says it has been learned from Mytilene that British aeroplanes bombarded Zagagik, near Smyrna yesterday, destroyed the barracks, the telephone office and eight houses. A destroyer which followed the aeroplanes also bombarded the city, in which there were said to be a large number of victims. The governor of Smyrna, fearing an attack, sent 8000 men to reinforce the coast defense troops, he dispatch adds.

The Turks are concentrating new works about Smyrna and large calibre cannon have been placed along the Smyrna-Skala Vourla road.

BARNES SCARED BY SOCIALISM

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 12.—William Barnes, Jr., today warned the constitutional convention, now in session here, that if a step was not put to what he termed "socialistic" or class legislation, there would be established in this country, an autocratic state similar to that of Germany "denying utterly the American theory of equality."

SEVERE EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS RECORDED

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 12.—A dispatch to the Frankfurter Zeitung from Ljubach, Austria, under date of August 11, says that a particularly severe earthquake, the strongest of any recorded since the establishment of the observatory there, were registered at frequent intervals yesterday. The most violent shock occurred at 10:11 o'clock in the forenoon, information concerning the main zone of disturbances is lacking, but the secondary zone embraces all of southern Italy where undulatory shocks occurred.

GERMAN SPY IS ARRESTED IN FLORIDA

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Aug. 12.—August Ortoloph, held here today for arraignment on a charge of having made drawings of military reservations on a charge of having made drawings of military reservations and light houses along the coast, claims German nationality, according to jail officers. He denied, they said, reports that he was of Austrian birth and had received assistance from relatives in America.

NEW HUMAN BIRD COMES TO FRISCO FAIR



SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 9.—Signor (not Senor) Silvio Pettrossi, who is in San Francisco to astonish the gaping exhibition crowds with aeroplane stunts, can't speak English. He doesn't need to. Signora Pettrossi—pretty, oh, very pretty and ever so young—speaks English for her daring husband.

Signor Pettrossi comes from Asuncion, Paraguay. He was educated in the wonderful technical schools of Italy. Before the outbreak of the European war he finished a course in aeroplaning in the school of Deperstassin, the famous builder of the monoplane of that name, near Paris.

Signora Pettrossi was born in Uruguay, and educated in France. They have been married six months.

Pettrossi's monoplane, one of the lightest machines of its type on this hemisphere, is being set up by his devoted Italian mechanic—who refuses to sleep in a hotel since that takes him too far from his beloved charge. Exposition authorities had to provide a bed for him beside the monoplane.

Some of Aviator Pettrossi's daring stunts are: "dead-leaf drift," "top drop," consisting of a spinning descent upon a vertical line that puts the spiral dip out of business; the "vertical turn," the "wing loop-the-loop," made from side to side which puts the head-on variety of loop-the-loop on the shelf as a thriller.

SUGAR FACTORY BUILDER DUE IN CITY TOMORROW

F. S. Branwell, representing the Western Sugar company, is in Grants Pass and Gold Hill this afternoon, and according to a telephone message received by W. H. Gore will arrive in this city in the morning. His visit will decide definitely the final details in the proposed building of a \$600,000 sugar beet factory in the Rogue river valley. His first object will be to make a tour of the best beet tracts planted throughout the valley with Samuel Stacey, the sugar beet soil expert, and the next step will be a meeting with the beet sugar committee formed last spring. According to the reports submitted, the one obstacle in the path of the

construction work is the establishment of the fact that the locally grown beets, possess the required amount of saccharine substance to make their milling profitable. The beets are now just beginning to develop and it is the stage when the sugar is formed in the fiber. The beets, as far as size, texture and quality are concerned are above the standard. An inspection of sugar beet conditions in the lower Rogue river valley is being made.

Citizens in charge of the sugar beet plant campaign have decided to organize their work along highly efficient lines. They will systematize every detail of the work. The establishment of a sugar beet factory is held as being vital the future industrial prosperity of the valley, and is closely linked with the irrigation campaign now near to assurance of success.

The sugar beet committee will establish offices in this city, and make a thorough campaign for acreage.

AITKEN FISH SCREEN ADOPTED BY STATE

At its monthly meeting at Salem Wednesday the state fish and game commission adopted the screen for ditches patented by J. S. Aitken, of Medford as the official screen for use to prevent the destruction of fish fry by irrigation and mining runoffs. The state will pay Mr. Aitken a royalty of \$1.50 a screen up to four feet in width, with a sliding royalty for large screens. It is the intention of having the screen manufactured at the penitentiary and supplied ditch owners at cost and the attorney general was asked for an opinion upon the legality of the procedure.

Proposals for a trout hatchery at Battle Falls were favorably received and an investigation of sites ordered, with the compilation of other data. S. S. Smith of Medford presented the claims for local anglers.
