BRITISH LOSE IN JUTLAND BATTLE

BERLIN, Aug. 19.—German torpedo boat destroyers have sunk a small British cruiser and a British destroyer by torpedoing them in an engagement of small craft off the west coast of Jutland, the German admiralty announced today.

The admiralty announcement adds that in the naval airship raid on London Tuesday night, important establishments in the city and on the Thames were bombarded with good results. Blast furnaces at Woodbridge and Ipswich also were bombarded, the statement says.

The text of the statement says: "On August 17, at 2 o'clock, five boats of one of our torpedo boat flotillas attacked a small modern British cruiser and eight torpedo boat destroyers near Hornsuff lightship on the west coast of Jutland, and sank the cruiser and one destroyer with torpedoes. Our forces had no losses."

"During the night of the 17th and 18th our naval airships again attacked London. London city and important Thames establishments were liberally bombarded. Good results were achieved. In addition factories and blast furnaces at Woodbridge and Ipswich were bombarded."

TEXAS CITY HIT HARD BY STORM

SAN ANTONIO, Aug. 19.—In point of size, Texas City suffered more than Galveston. This may have been due to the fact that there were fewer substantial buildings and that less apprehension was felt. The first part of Texas City to be inundated was the soldier's camp just above the city. This tract of land is now leveled and reserved to a swamp.

The damage at Houston will run into far more money than was at first anticipated. Citizens of Houston estimate that the loss will reach \$1,000,000.
