ASK PROOF SPY OF KAISER IS NAVAL EMPLOYEE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—In an announcement issued by the navy department today, Secretary Daniels said he had asked John R. Rathom, publisher of the Providence, R. I. Journal, to submit any evidence he might have to substantiate a published statement credited to him that a civil employe of the navy department was in the pay of the German government.

Mr. Daniels also revealed that after a recent conference with Mr. Rathom the department had assigned additional officers and men to the naval force operating the German-owned wireless plant at Sayville, L. I.

Mr. Daniels said that Mr. Rathom intimated that he had information also regarding an alleged German scheme to secure control of all radio stations in South and Central America and even in the Philippines.

Champion Pacer Sold. CLEVELAND, Aug. 19.—William 1587g, world's champion pacer stallion, has been sold by A. Earl Vinnatta, his owner, to C. K. J. Billings, New York horseman, for \$25,000. William will be withdrawn from racing and placed in the stud.

FRANCE UNITED AND DETERMINED TO WIN STRUGGLE

PARIS, Aug. 19.—A joint inspection of parts of the water battle line was made Monday by Lord Kitchener, Alexandre Millerand, the French war minister, General Joffre and Sir John French, the commanders in chief of the British and French armies.

Lord Kitchener and General Joffre were impressed by the moral of the troops. M. Millerand in the course of an address said:

"After a year of war, the enemy no longer has illusions of winning. He predicts internal dissensions among the enemies which he hopes will occur. Already he is endeavoring to incite neutrals, and places before belligerents veiled innuendoes of peace.

"Let me assure you France is united. People, parliament and government never have been more firmly determined, in close accord with our heroic and faithful allies, never to lay down our arms until the day arrives when we shall have attained our goal, and if the road to Tipperary is long, the price is sufficiently high to justify its cost for paying for all the delays, difficulties and sadnesses along the road, because its price is the liberation of the world."
