THE KAISER WASTING MONEY

THE king can do no wrong, and whatever the kaiser does is right in the eyes of the German apologists in the United States. Hence every atrocity against civilization committed in the campaign of terrorization inaugurated by the imperial paranoiac-straightway finds defenders in the United States.

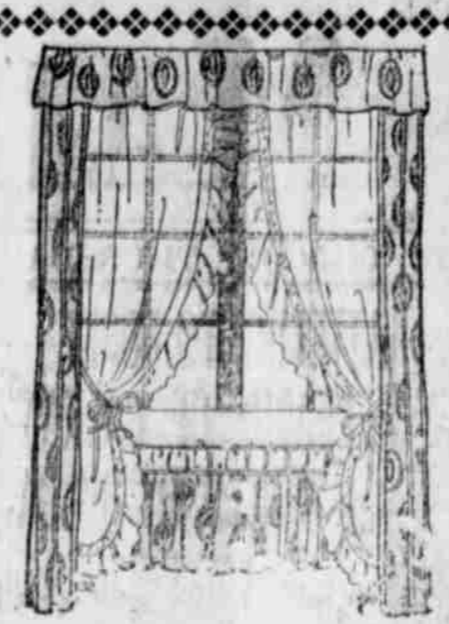
