Duke was a kitten tiger, about three years old, and it was discovered that the aching member was one of his milk teeth, and to pull it would be liable to injure the new toothies just showing through the gums. A small steel-cutting saw did the work, and without pain, for Miss Stark practices painless dentistry only.
