At a boxing bout at the Army last Tuesday evening it was universally conceded that "Young Eaton," a local amateur, decidedly got the better of his professional antagonist, Bud Shamrock, an importation from Seattle. It is even reported that the latter gracefully yielded the honors and offered to stake \$200 that Eaton could win over any antagonist on the coast in the lightweight championship class. Bruce Hastings, a local barber, refereed the skirmish. In the preliminary bout between Jeter and Burnett, also local amateurs, the former had the better of the fistie argument. The attendance was slim, perhaps owing to a rival attraction on the Plaza, where the Personal Liberty league were out in full force listening, free of charge, to exhortations heaped upon the body religious, social and politic, at the hands of a feminine exhorter. This appointment goes into effect on or about September 1. Its main object is to validate the tickets on through passenger business.

Two Ashland photographers, B. H. Hinthorne and Mrs. Wynne Scott, conduct studios in northern California towns, the former at Yreka and the latter at Dunsmuir. Hinthorne's studio at Yreka is a branch of his Ashland establishment.

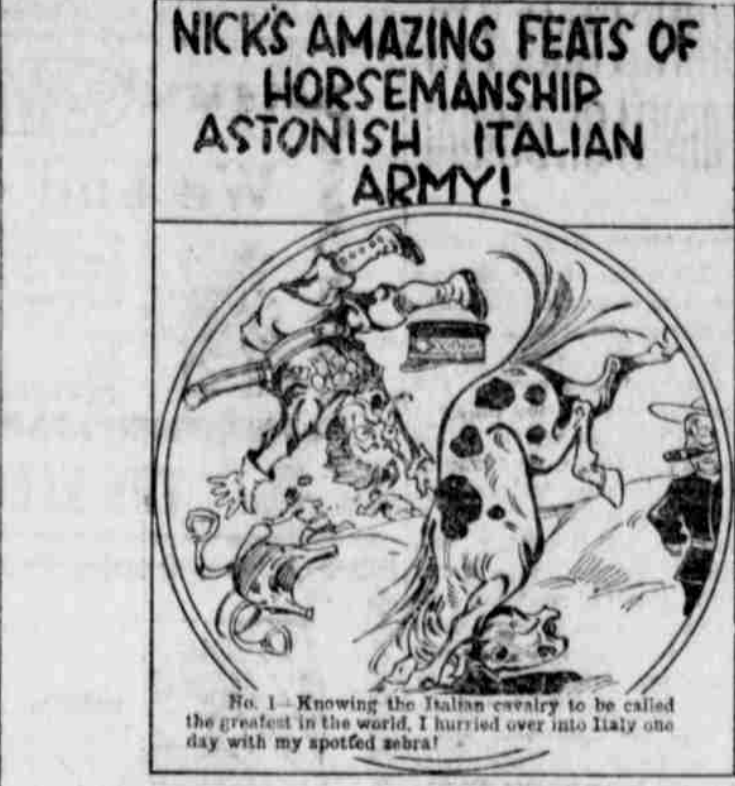

G. B. Skeen, local barber, has returned from a lengthy stay in the central west, having visited old familiar scenes in Kansas, Nebraska and Oklahoma.

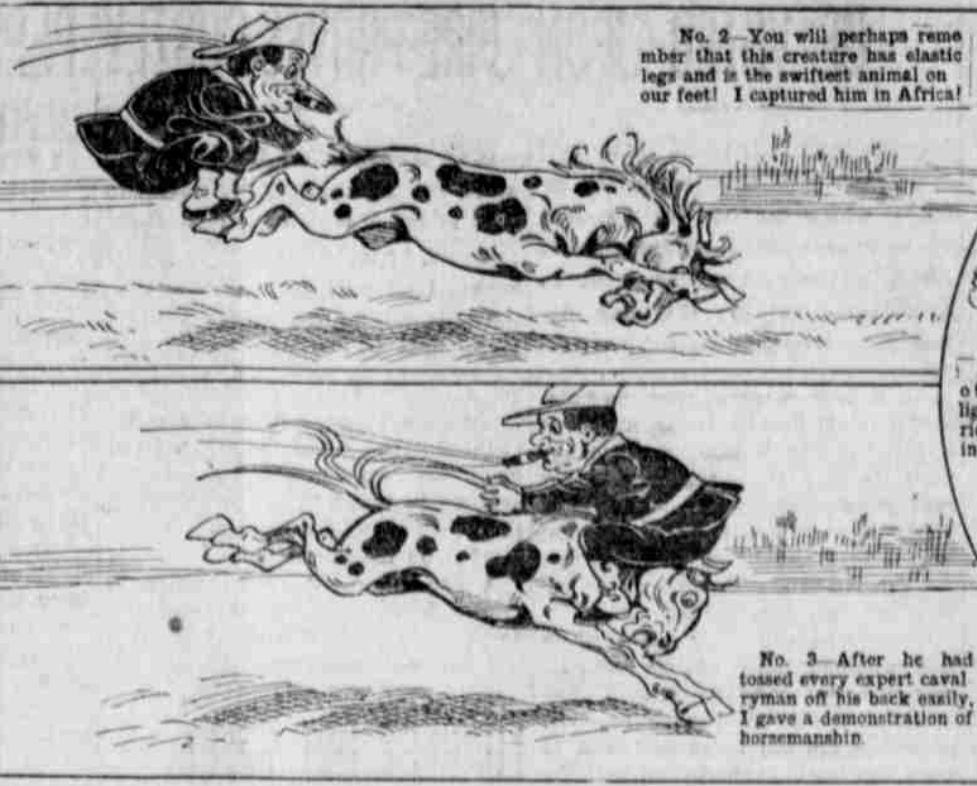
