GERMANY CALLS FOR NEW WAR LOAN

BERLIN, Sept. 2, by wireless to Sayville—The managers of the Reich bank have issued a formal call for subscriptions to the new war loan. The newspapers point out editorially that great advantages are offered to investors who are able to obtain with their savings nine year imperial bonds paying five per cent. The loan has several new features. The issue will be confined to bonds, no treasury notes being sold. Moreover, it will be possible for the first time to purchase these bonds at post-offices.

SEEK TO STABILIZE EXCHANGE SITUATION

PARIS, Sept. 2.—The French and British delegates who are to go to New York to confer with American bankers on the abnormal exchange situation, probably will propose that American bankers advance sums sufficient to stabilize measurably the exchange market. It is understood that American securities will be offered as a guarantee and that the proceeds of the loan will be used in settlement of bills for American exports now due.

SPACKMAN MOUNTAIN FIRE UNDER CONTROL

WALLA WALLA, Wn., Sept. 2.—The fire on Spackman mountain which yesterday threatened to get beyond control and into the Wenaha forest reserve, is reported today to have been controlled by backfiring. About 200 acres have been burned over and three farm-houses destroyed. In the Wenaha forest there are no fires at all, Supervisor J. M. Schmitz reports, this season having been the best ever experienced here are regards fires.

MEXICAN RAIDERS BURN RAILROAD TRESTLE

BROWNSVILLE, Texas, Sept. 2.—United States troops today were trailing a band of Mexican raiders, who set fire to and partly burned a railroad trestle 14 miles north of Brownsville shortly after midnight. Special troop trains from Brownsville, Harlingen and San Benito were hurried to the scene about 2 o'clock this morning. Reports at 10 o'clock said the Mexicans had not been overtaken.

425,000 HORSES SHIPPED WAR ZONE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—To date 425,000 horses and mules have been shipped out of the United States for the European belligerents. Purchase of the animals has been a big boon in the market for medium class horses. Government experts find that very few high-bred horses have been exported, with the result that prices for ordinary equines have increased. Most of the horses have gone to England, but many shipments have been made to France and some to Italy. Government officials estimate that there are today approximately 21,000,000 horses and 4,000,000 mules in this country.

According to Brown's story as given out by the police, Mrs. Mohr proposed several weeks ago that he kill Dr. Mohr, promising to pay him \$5,000 nine days after the killing was accomplished. He said he asked Spellman to help him out and brought his half brother up to talk the matter over with Mrs. Mohr. Heals is present at this interview by request of Mrs. Mohr, Brown said. Spellman was to receive \$1,000 and Brown and Heals \$2,000 each. The arrangements for the shooting were carried out in detail, according to the confession. At a designated spot on the Nayatt road Heals stalled the engine of the automobile and Brown and Spellman, who had approached on motorcycles, crept up through the bushes and fired at the occupants of the car. Brown said he shot Dr. Mohr and Spellman wounded Miss Burger. After the shooting Brown and Spellman went back to the motorcycles. They threw the revolvers into a brook.
