TOTAL DEAD 812 ON STEAMSHIP EASTLAND

CHICAGO, Sept. 3.—Final tabulations compiled and made public today by the coroner's office show that 812 persons lost their lives when the steamer Eastland with 2500 on board capsized in the Chicago river, July 24. According to the figures, of this number 451 were women, and 361 men. Of the total 226 were married. Ninety eight of the victims were under 16 years old. The Eastland was docked and piled under guard three weeks after the disaster and the result of investigations still in progress is awaited before final plans for its disposition are made.

BRUSH FIRES IN GOLD HILL DISTRICT

Brush fires are burning briskly in the Gold Hill district, and a force of men are held in readiness in case the flames menace the standing timber. On Foot's creek the flames have advanced into the timber, but are doing no damage, instead burning off the heavy undergrowth. The fires in the Butte Falls district are all under control, and dying out fast. Watchers are on the trails guarding against a further outbreak, as a recurrence of the flames of the last ten days would menace more of the best timber in Jackson county. The height of the danger for this year has been passed according to forestry service officials.

MAYOR ROLPH'S SHIP SUNK BY SUBMARINE

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 3.—The British ship William T. Lewis, owned by Hind, Rolph and company of San Francisco, was sunk today off Queens-town by a submarine, according to a message received here by the marine department of the chamber of commerce. She sailed from Everett, Wn., March 29, for Sherness, England, with a cargo of lumber.

GUN EXPLODES IN ED BROWN'S HAND

By the explosion of the barrel of a Remington rifle he was testing, Ed G. Brown this morning suffered laceration of his left hand that may bring amputation of the forefinger. The accident occurred at the target grounds near the fair grounds. Brown and R. L. Ewing went to the grounds with the gun, which Brown contemplated buying for his wife. Ewing discharged the weapon three times. Brown then placed the rifle to his shoulder for a trial shot, and the barrel split where the hand gripped with the pulling of the trigger. The gun was of high power and the latest make.

The injured man was rushed to the Sacred Heart hospital and medical assistance given. The gun will be sent back to the factory for examination.

CADZOW CUTS LEG SEVERING AN ARTERY

Word was received this afternoon by the forestry service that John Cadzow, proprietor of a merchandise store at Butte Falls, assisting Forest Supervisor Martin L. Erickson in forest fighting operations in that section, was being rushed to Eagle Point, in a precarious condition, due to loss of blood caused by an ax wound. The blade glanced from a knot of a tree Cadzow was chopping and pierced the calf of the left leg to the bone, severing an artery. Cadzow was packed two miles on a limb litter, after first aid remedies had been administered. An auto with a doctor is rushing from Eagle Point to meet the machine bringing the injured man to Eagle Point.
