

MRS. MOHR DENIES GUILT, DECLARING HER INNOCENCE

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Sept. 3.—Amid the preparations for the funeral of her husband, of whose death she is accused, Mrs. Elizabeth Tiffany Blair Mohr today lost her composure for the first time since suspicion fell upon her.

She today reiterated her declarations of innocence and insisted that the story of the three negroes that she had hired them to dispose of her husband was concocted after their plot to rob Dr. Mohr had resulted in his murder.

It was learned that she had told the police that her life with Mr. Mohr had been most unhappy, that he taunted her and made her witness his attentions to other women. It was "in one of my jealous moods" that she wrote the letter threatening Miss Emily G. Burger, she said.

According to the officers she also admitted that she had talked with the doctor's chauffeur, George W. Healis, and C. Victor Brown, who had sought from them "to find out what the doctor was doing."

Brown and Healis, with Henry Spellman, were alleged accomplices of Mrs. Mohr, who was involved by their confessions.

MEXICAN RAIDERS SPARE GERMAN

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—The war department today received the following report sent last night by Colonel Bullard, commanding in the Brownsville district, of the fighting with Mexican bandits yesterday after a bridge east of San Benito had been burned:

"Detachments third cavalry, twelfth cavalry and twenty-sixth infantry drove into brush Mexican bandits who burned bridge last night at a point about seven miles east of San Benito and are making all arrangements to take up pursuit tomorrow morning. Lieutenant Faulkner, twenty-sixth infantry, with half company C, had running fight with enemy this afternoon, killing one, wounding one and recapturing one American prisoner. The casualties among soldiers when skirmish, bandits immediately killed two prisoners, Donaldson and Smith."

In transmitting the report, Major-General Funston said he had private advices from Brownsville that the raiders had spared the one American prisoner recaptured because he was said to be a German citizen.

DRY ISSUE UP TO COLORADO COURTS

DENVER, Sept. 3.—The state supreme court will be asked to take original jurisdiction in actions seeking to enjoin the city and county of Denver from granting saloon licenses extending beyond January 1, 1916, it was announced today by Fred Farrar, attorney general. Colorado's state-wide "dry" constitutional amendment becomes effective on that date.

City and county officials of Denver will join in the request.

The attorney general will base his request on the ground that every phase of the prohibition situation presents constitutional questions and chaos and disorder will prevail unless there is a speedy decision by the supreme court.

PROBING DESERTIONS CAUSES HIS SUICIDE

PARIS, Sept. 3.—The idea that a soldier of France should desert the army at the time of his country's greatest need, so weighed upon the mind of Lieutenant Poncet that he committed suicide today under the hallucination that he himself was a deserter.

The lieutenant was a clerk of the supreme court and had been detailed to act as a representative of the ministry of justice before the second court-martial of Paris. He was called upon to investigate many cases of desertion. His mind thus fixed upon this subject, it came to haunt him and preyed upon him until he became delirious. Today he shot himself.

GRIZZLIES ELECTION ON BALD MOUNTAIN

The Grizzlies will hold their annual meeting and election of officers Saturday night, September 11, on the slopes of Bald mountain, after the fashion of the Bohemian club of San Francisco, which gives complete plays among the big trees of California, with the natural scenery of the redwoods for a background.

The club met at the library last night for the purpose of perfecting plans for the occasion. The meeting will commence with a 6 o'clock supper at the camp ground among the pines, followed by games until dark. A vaudeville performance will then be staged among the trees, with the members as chief actors. At 11 o'clock the election of officers will take place, after which the vaudeville will be resumed and concluded and all will retire for a few hours' sleep. A special bus will leave Medford at 8 p. m. in order that the Grizzlies who clerk in the stores may take part in the election.

Sunday breakfast will initiate many into the mystery of cooking, and especially so concerning the flapjack. The morning will be free for a climb to the top of the mountain, after which it is planned to have a venison barbecue for the noonday meal.

This year's officers will have charge of the program. The club will furnish coffee, sugar, milk, beans, flapjack batter, butter, lard and a tent for the ladies. The members will furnish their blankets, knife, fork and frying pan, besides a small amount of miscellaneous lunch.

It is six miles via auto to the mountain, then a mile and a half to the camp. This is the biggest night of the year with the Grizzlies and it is proposed to make it a permanent affair at the same location. Should it rain, the election of officers will take place at the library and the entertainment will be postponed.

MRS. MOHR IN CHARGE OF DEAD HUSBAND'S FUNERAL

PROVIDENCE, R. I., Sept. 3.—Although accused of having incited the murder of her husband, Dr. C. Franklin Mohr, one of the wealthiest physicians in the state, Mrs. Elizabeth Tiffany Blair Mohr, released on bonds of \$10,000, had full charge of the funeral today of her husband, from whom she had been separated for several months.

Only intimate friends of the family were asked to attend the services. A large detail of police was sent to guard the Mohr home and hold in check inquisitive spectators.

Arthur Cushing, Mrs. Mohr's attorney, said today that he would begin a search for the doctor's will as soon as the funeral was over. He could not estimate the value of Dr. Mohr's estate, but friends of the physician who knew the extent of his practice said that the property would be worth \$500,000.
