FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 6.—R. Norris Williams, II, the champion and Maurice E. McLoughlin, ex-champion, but ranking player of the United States, were to meet opponents of considerably lower standing in the semi-finals of the National Tennis tournament handicap, but neither of them apparently had an easy step to the final round.

Theodore Roosevelt Pell, McLoughlin's antagonist, has lost only one set during five rounds and defeated such players as Edward H. Whitney, Watson M. Washburn, Charles M. Hull, Jr., and Irving C. Wright.

William Johnston of San Francisco, who will oppose Williams, has been the sensation of the tournament, his most noteworthy accomplishment being the elimination of Carl Behr, rated the third best player in the country.

BRITISH TELLS OF DAMAGE FLEET IN NORTH SEA

LONDON, Sept. 6. (delayed in transmission).—During his visit to the British battle fleet in the last week the correspondent after boarding all of the most important ships witnessed the magnificent spectacle—that of the whole force putting to sea.

Officers on Vice Admiral Sir David Beatty's flagship, the Lion, which has received the roughest handling in battle of any major British ship now afloat, told of the difficulty they had to persuade the young commander to descend at the opening of the action on January 24 from the bridge where he had an unhindered vision, to the armored protection of the conning tower. They gave an exciting account of the destroyers in falling all efforts of submarines to reach the crippled Lion as she was being towed home at five knots an hour after sinking the German cruiser Bluecher.

A very small percentage of the German shells hit the Lion at the 18,000 yard range of the early stage of the battle, officers say, but the screams of passing salvos and the crack of their own guns caused an inconceivable tumult to sound in the ears of those stationed on the bridge.

The Tiger had fewer scars to show as a result of the North Sea battle.

The inflexible was struck by a mine at the Bardselles and was under heavy fire from shore. All the ships which have been in action have fragments of German shells set in mountings as mementos.

While on board the flagship of Admiral Sir John Jellicoe a message was brought to the commander in chief who called a secretary and spoke briefly to him. The whole fleet had been ordered to weigh anchor and proceed to sea. Guests on board a destroyer at the mouth of the harbor watched that unprecedented procession of naval power make its exit led

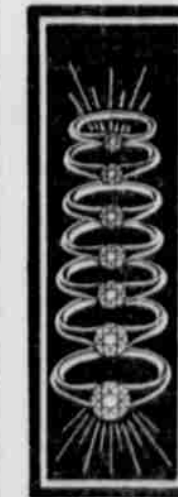
