

# CORONER'S JURY FINDS CANTRALL COMMITTED SUICIDE

A coroner's autopsy at Klamath Falls Monday revealed that Roscoe E. Cantrall, died by his own hand from taking potassium cyanide—the most powerful poison known to science. Death was instantaneous. Worry over financial troubles is given as the reason for the rash act. Cantrall was born and raised upon the Applegate. His brother Miles still lives there. He was 43 years of age, and well known in this city and valley. For fifteen years he lived in the Klamath country, and operated a saw-mill at Seac.

Cantrall purchased the poison with which he ended his life Saturday on a visit to Klamath Falls, and was morose and despondent at the time according to evidence gathered by the coroner. Before leaving for home Saturday evening he called upon a number of old friends and kin and bade them good bye, though this procedure was so couched as to arouse no suspicion.

The poison was administered near midnight in an outbuilding of his home, and the body was found shortly afterwards. He is survived by a wife and one child. The funeral services were held Wednesday morning.

# STOLEN WATCHES FOUND IN IRRIGATION DITCH

An express package containing "Gruen" watches, consigned to Martin Reddy of this city, was stolen from the express car of northbound passenger No. 16 Wednesday night, at Ashland, and found this morning in an irrigation ditch near that city. The thief in fleeing with his loot, tried to jump the ditch and failed. The package was dropped in the water, and the water soaked watches were delivered to the local jeweler this morning. The express package was missed upon the arrival of the train at this city, and a message was sent to Ashland as a tracer. The watches were valued at \$150, and were of the latest make and design. They were shipped from Cincinnati. There is not the slightest trace of the thief.

# CALIFORNIA FEEDING GRAPES TO SWINE

FRESNO, Cal., Sept. 16.—Grapes by the thousands of tons are being dried by growers in the vicinity of Fresno this season to be used as hog feed. This method of utilizing the wine grapes was determined upon by many growers after an announcement last week by the California Grape Growers' association that no grapes would be purchased this year.

The grape growers who also raise hogs and are to feed their own dried grapes to their hogs believe that in the end they will fare better than the men who will be compelled to sell their cured grapes on the market.

# BRITISH SUBMARINE SUNK AT DARDANELLES

LONDON, Sept. 16.—British casualties at the Dardanelles up to August 21 were 87,630. The number killed in that time was 17,608. These figures were included in the grand total of British casualties published earlier in the week.

Today's announcement says the number of officers killed was 1130, and the number of men 16,478; wounded 2371 officers and 69,257 men; missing, 373 officers, and 6021 men.

# HALLEY'S AUTO WRECKED BY TRAIN

A Dodge automobile, belonging to R. E. Halley of the Palace rooming house, and driven by Miss Gladys Wilson was demolished Wednesday evening by northbound Southern Pacific passenger train No. 16, at the Bear Creek orchard crossing. Mrs. Halley accompanied Miss Wilson. The engine auto "died" on the track while the women were opening a gate. The engine of the train stopped after he had struck the machine.

According to eye witnesses the train was 900 feet away when the engine gave his first warning blast, and that he continued to blow the whistle as the women ran up the track waiting for the engineer to halt. Miss Wilson made an effort to start the car, but failed, and added her efforts to those being made to stop the train, afterwards.

Attorney Gus Newbury has been retained by Halley, and a claim for damages will be filed against the railroad upon the grounds that the engineer could have stopped within 900 feet.

It is said here that Von Hindenburg's drive is losing its vigor, while Von Mackensen is striving to overcome the difficulties of the march country and the Austrians appear to be unable to regain the upper hand in Galicia.

# MEXICAN RIOTS FAIL TO MATERIALIZE ALONG RIO GRANDE

EL PASO, Texas, Sept. 15.—All was quiet on the Rio Grande from Del Rio, Texas, 400 miles east of here and on the border as far west as Columbus, N. M., when the celebration of Mexico's independence day began today.

Automobiles bearing the national tri-color appeared on the streets. The police frequently insisted upon the cars carrying the American flag, in addition to the tri-color, and in such cases the tri-color usually was removed.

An early alarm of a Mexican outbreak at Del Rio, Texas, caused a strengthening of the patrols of custom house river guards and soldiers, but there was no sign of a demonstration when dawn broke.

BROWNSVILLE, Texas, Sept. 16.—Beginning at midnight, the start of Mexican Independence day, there was much shooting and shouting along the Mexican side of the river, but no disorders were observed and nothing in the nature of a threat toward the American side of the river. All early reports to the army and civil officials indicated a peaceful celebration of the holiday by Mexicans of this section.
