> SALEM, Ore., Sept. 17 .- Following a prolonged debate, the resolution committee of the Oregon-Calicommittee of five to draft'h resolution asking congress to provide the machinery for the enforcement of the original railroad grant, which provides for the sale of the land to settlers at \$2.50 per acre, and to report the resolution back to the committee for consideration.

Sentiment in the committee and also in the conference seemed well crystalized in favor of such a resolution, and the opinion was ventured by leaders that it had an excellent chance of adoption.

The committee was instructed to recite in the resolutions the rights claimed by the state and railroad company, and to declare against the lands being put into a forest reserve. "The grant is both law and contract," said H. H .Hewitt, in speaking in favor of the committee preparing a resolution which would call Lydia E. 


