ASK LAND GRANT BE SOLD UNDER ORIGINAL TERMS

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 17.—Following a prolonged debate, the resolution committee of the Oregon-California railroad land grant conference, in session here today, appointed a sub-committee of five to draft a resolution asking congress to provide the machinery for the enforcement of the original railroad grant, which provides for the sale of the land to settlers at \$2.50 per acre, and to report the resolution back to the committee for consideration.

Sentiment in the committee and also in the conference seemed well crystallized in favor of such a resolution, and the opinion was ventured by leaders that it had an excellent chance of adoption.

The committee was instructed to recite in the resolutions the rights claimed by the state and railroad company, and to declare against the lands being put into a forest reserve.

"The grant is both law and contract," said H. H. Hewitt, in speaking in favor of the committee preparing a resolution which would call for the enforcement of the original grant. "The company is under compulsion to sell the lands when a settler presents himself for them, and the principal thing to do is to have congress define an actual settler, and fix a time for the disposal of the lands."

Former Congressman A. W. Lafferty, C. E. Spence and E. J. Stack were defeated a second time today in their attempt to increase the solutions committee membership from 23 to 25.
