MEN AND TEAMS NEEDED TO BUILD FISH LAKE DAM

More men and more teams are needed by the Rogue River Canal Co. in the completion of their irrigation projects in the Rogue river valley. This was the announcement of Manager J. T. Sullivan this morning. He said they were experiencing difficulty in securing laborers, and that every available citizen with a desire to work had been pressed into service. During the week, the auto trucks hauling supplies to the Fish Lake work have been placed on night and day shifts. Between 200 and 250 men will be at work at Fish Lake within ten days. The dam will be completed by the middle of November.

An electric light plant will be installed at Fish Lake this week to furnish light for night work. The contractors have been operating with old fashioned circuits. This has proven unsatisfactory. A dozen are lights will be installed. Next week 250 tons of supplies and materials, all purchased in this city will be hauled to the lake.

Tests have been made in the Phoenix district for bedrock at the reservoir site, and the contracts will be left at once for the concrete work on the storage dam.

The company expects to ready to furnish water for irrigation for 1916. Work on the Fish Lake and Phoenix projects will be rushed to completion.

FALLEN COUPLE TO LEAVE TOWN

Laura Graves, a fallen woman, and Ray Langlois, a fallen man, her companion in a series of escapades in drunkenness and debauchery, were found guilty of vagrancy before Justice of the Peace Glenn O. Taylor, Friday afternoon, and given sentences of 30 days in jail, and a fine of \$100. The fine and the sentence were commuted for both upon their promise to be outside of Jackson county this afternoon by 5:00 o'clock. Thursday night the woman and Langlois, and a rival for the hand of Mrs. Graves, engaged in a fight with beer bottles, on East Main street, the battle raging at its height upon the lawn of Chief of Police Hittson. This brought the pair to the city jail, the third party escaping on horseback.

For the last three months, the police say she has been in a continual state of intoxication, sleeping in barns, vacant houses, and hay stacks. Recently Mrs. Graves has been working on a ranch. During most of this period she has associated with tramps and presided at alley "can rushing" parties. The woman says she is a confirmed alcoholic.

Ray Langlois, whose courting of Mrs. Graves has brought him into prominence, is well known to the police.

SERBIANS ARE ACTIVE ALONG THE DANUBE. NISH, Serbia, Sept. 16.—(Delayed in transmission)—The Serbian war office today made public the following official communication: "On the 12th and 13th of September, small enemy detachments attempted to cross the river Drina at Viasegrad, opposite Goung Glave, but was repulsed."

"On the 13th, on the Danube front, we prevented the construction of fortification works on the left bank of the river opposite Adecle.

"On the Save front, opposite Belgrade, there has been a duel between our artillery and that of the enemy posted on the heights of Belany. The enemy's guns were soon silenced.

"On the night of the 13th, an enemy detachment succeeded in crossing the Save, near Zasavitz, but was routed by one of our patrols. The night of September 13-14 the enemy attempted to cross the Save near Carchnitz with two barges filled with soldiers, but we prevented him from crossing."
