RUSSIANS SEEK FINANCIAL HELP FROM HER ALLIES

PARIS, Sept. 21, 1 p. m.—Pierre L. Bark, Russian minister of finance, has concluded his conference with the French finance minister, Alexandre Ribot. He departed today for London to take up financial matters affecting the allies with Reginald McKenna, British chancellor of the exchequer.

M. Bark alluded to "the lively sympathies of Americans toward Russia when she was emancipating the serfs, at the same time that America abolished slavery and maintained the Union." He said:

"Russia is going through a different period as regards exchange. We cannot export our products and there is a lack of remittances from abroad. Russia has large payments to make abroad and she cannot make them in goods or products.

"That difficulty was examined closely in February and the French and British governments came to the assistance of Russia with advances which have been employed to pay coupons and purchase supplies. Evidently this policy of co-operation must be continued. That is one of the questions which the ministers of finance are considering.

"Certain precautions must be taken to raise the sale of exchange for the ruble and give it stability. Improvement in exchange will facilitate importations into Russia, which now are obstructed by depreciation of the ruble.

"Russia is putting into the common effort with her allies all her resources in men and money. She receives from her allies indispensable co-operation. Inferior to the Germans in the beginning, from the point of view of preparation for the war, we have made up part of the disadvantage through the common effort of the government, the people, the duma and the council of the empire. We shall continue to decrease the difference between ourselves and our enemies in this respect."

INFURIATED YAQUIS MURDER WOUNDED

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Sept. 21.—A massacre of thirty wounded Carranza troops by infuriated Yaqui Indians during the fighting Sunday, which resulted in a complete rout of the Carranza army under General Calles, was reported here today by arrivals from the battlefield. The Indians carried in savage warfare after their leader, General Urbulejo, commander-in-chief of the Yaqui-Villa army in Sonora, was desperately wounded by having a leg blown off by a piece of shell.

IOWA BANK FORCE HELD FRAUD CHARGE

DUBUQUE, Ia., Sept. 21.—George J. Homan, cashier, Joseph F. Haragan, vice-president and teller, and George R. Souge, teller of the Dubuque National bank, were arrested today on warrants issued by federal authorities charging embezzlement and misapplication of funds of the bank, totaling about \$20,000.

SMOOTH DETAIL IN ALLIES' LOAN NEAR AGREEMENT

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—Negotiations toward the establishment of a credit loan of from \$600,000,000 to \$800,000,000 to Great Britain and France moved smoothly today, it was said, with vital elimination of the question of paying for munitions and with the reported determination of both sides not to tie up the whole sum at one time in New York.

Subordination of troublesome questions of a way for paying for munitions of war has not simply postponed a decision on this point, in the opinion of the Anglo-French commission, as reflected by its callers, but will result in its gradual disappearance. These bankers have assumed that the big credit would undoubtedly not be intended to cover every dollar's worth of exports, but that Great Britain and France would continue to remit gold to America and also would sell American securities in this market.

These methods, it was thought, would imply provide a way of taking the munitions question out of the negotiations. The first big problem, as the commission and its American assistants viewed it, was to stabilize exchange. This could be done by establishing a credit covering foodstuffs and cotton alone, hardly reckoning manufactured articles or munitions. With exchange stabilized, it was thought, there would be little difficulty in paying for munitions.

Proposals before the commission also were said to provide for installment payments by banks guaranteeing the big loan and the deposit in the subscribing banks of all subscriptions, without interest, until such time as they are needed. Another feature said to have come up for discussion was whether the short term bonds, on which the loan is to be issued, could not be made to include the privilege of conversion to long term (fifty or one hundred years) bonds which would pay 4 1/2 per cent interest. These, it was thought, would be a favorite investment in the bond markets, inasmuch as they would be virtually a first mortgage on the British empire and France.
