# STEEL FRAGMENT PICKED UP ON HESPERIAN DECK

MONTREAL, Sept. 21.-Major Hercule Barre of a Canadian regiment, a survivor of the steamer Hesperian, today exhibited a piece of steel which he said he picked up on the deck of the Hesperian following the fatal explosion. The major declared the steel was part of a torpedo and termed the contention that the ship had struck a mine "absurd."

Major Barre, who was returning from service in Flanders, said that while Captain Main and other officers of the Hesperian showed coolness and courage after the ship was struck, the crew was far from competent. Thirty-six Canadian soldiers did valuable work in launching lifeboats and rescuing passengers. The major said all passengers and sailors should have been saved as he did not leave the ship until four hours after it was struck. He added that "everything seemed to go wrong and that there was a great difficulty in launching the boats."


