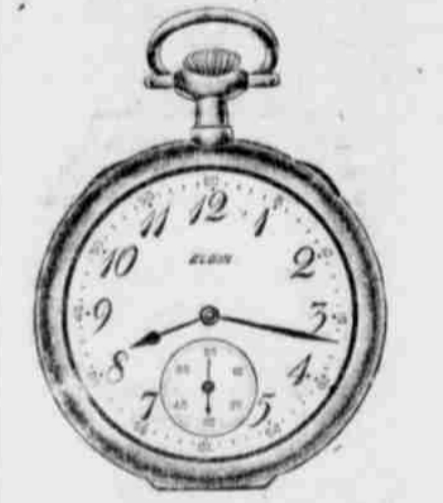
One airman after another rose, waving the tri-color, until 120 machines were maneuvering.
