A TRAITOR TO DEMOCRACY

IT is a source of surprise to Americans to read that the main reliance of the monarchial party in China, which aims to overthrow the republic and establish a monarchy is the advice of Dr. Frank J. Goodnow, president of John Hopkins University, foreign advisor to President Yuan Shi-Kai, who in a memorandum to the president of China states:

It is of course not susceptible of doubt that a monarchy is better suited than a republic to China. China's history and traditions, her social and economic conditions, her relations with foreign powers all make it probable that the country would develop that constitutional government which it must develop if it is to preserve its independence as a state, more easily as a monarchy than as a republic.

The utterance of Dr. Goodnow is quoted approvingly in the manifesto of the "Society of Peace" as the monarchist organization is named, as follows:

The United States of America is the senior republic of the world and her great student of politics, Dr. Goodnow, has stated that a monarchy is a better form of government than republicanism, and accordingly to his opinion, a monarchial form of government is almost indispensable at present to China. This view has been shared by not a few notable scholars of other countries. As Dr. Goodnow is a citizen of a republic, he is more competent to make such a statement than others. His words are, "The conditions are different in China and America and it is impossible to transplant one system from one country to another."

With all due respect to the scholastic attainments of Dr. Goodnow, this is mighty poor advice for a citizen of a democratic republic to be peddling the world's youngest democracy.

To begin with, the birth of the Chinese republic is not due to historical tradition that has kept China impotent for centuries, but due entirely to the awakening of China, the rising spirit of democracy among the younger Chinese, a spirit that has positively swept aside by a sudden revolution the claims of tradition.

To crush this spirit by restoration of the binding ties of monarchy and conservatism, to restore to privilege its perquisites at the expense of the people, to re-establish oligarchy and overthrow democracy is the advice of this tory American.

It has long been evident that Yuan is in reality an autocratic dictator and without sufficient patriotism to become a Washington to China. He is not at all averse to worshipping heaven as the emperor of China, and secretly instigates the monarchial propaganda.

If Yuan succeeds in his sinister effort to overthrow the republic it will undoubtedly precipitate a civil war, fatal to the unity of China in the future, and it will be a source of humiliation to every democratic American to know that the change was counseled, aided and advised by an American.

WHERE DISCIPLINE ENDS

KAISER WILHELM, according to a dispatch from Amsterdam, has sent an autograph letter to German generals on the western front informing them that an important allied victory will be considered due to culpable negligence on the part of German commanders, and therefore sufficient cause for severe disciplining.

It is reported that "disciplining" of German officers on the east front for permitting the Russians to escape from Vilna is already under way. Success, no matter how achieved, is the demand of this modern Moloch of militarism.

To be consistent, the kaiser should begin with himself. The battle of Ypres, in which the Germans were repulsed in their campaign to reach the English channel, with staggering losses, was fought under his personal direction and tens of thousands of his subjects mercilessly slaughtered in his mad and futile effort to reach his goal.

If the kaiser eliminates himself from the Spartan rule he prescribes for his generals, he demoralizes discipline further by continuing in command the crown prince, who though given the flower of the German army, has failed to make good anywhere along the line. The triumphant entry into Paris was reserved for this sprig of royalty, who blood lust is blamed for the holocaust, but his failure to keep up to schedule precipitated the disastrous battle of the Marne and lost Germany the war.

For a year since, the crown prince, though sacrificing 100,000 subjects, has been unable to gain an inch. For twelve months he has hammered away with Germany's finest troops at Verdun and been driven inch by inch back toward Metz by the despised plebeian French—accomplishing nothing.

Many worthy German generals have lost and will continue to lose rank, scapegoats of royal incompetence, by there will be no "discipline" for the crown prince. Was not the war precipitated to stem the rising tide of democracy, and insure his throne as the hero of the struggle "to save the fatherland"? Discipline is for the mass, not for the self-proclaimed partners of God.

SALEM FLOUR MILLS DESTROYED BY FIRE

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 28.—The store building of the Salem Flouring Mills was destroyed by fire here early today. Firemen succeeded in preventing the flames from spreading to the main buildings on either side. The loss amounts to \$25,000, the building being valued at \$10,000 and its contents at \$15,000. The loss was covered by insurance.

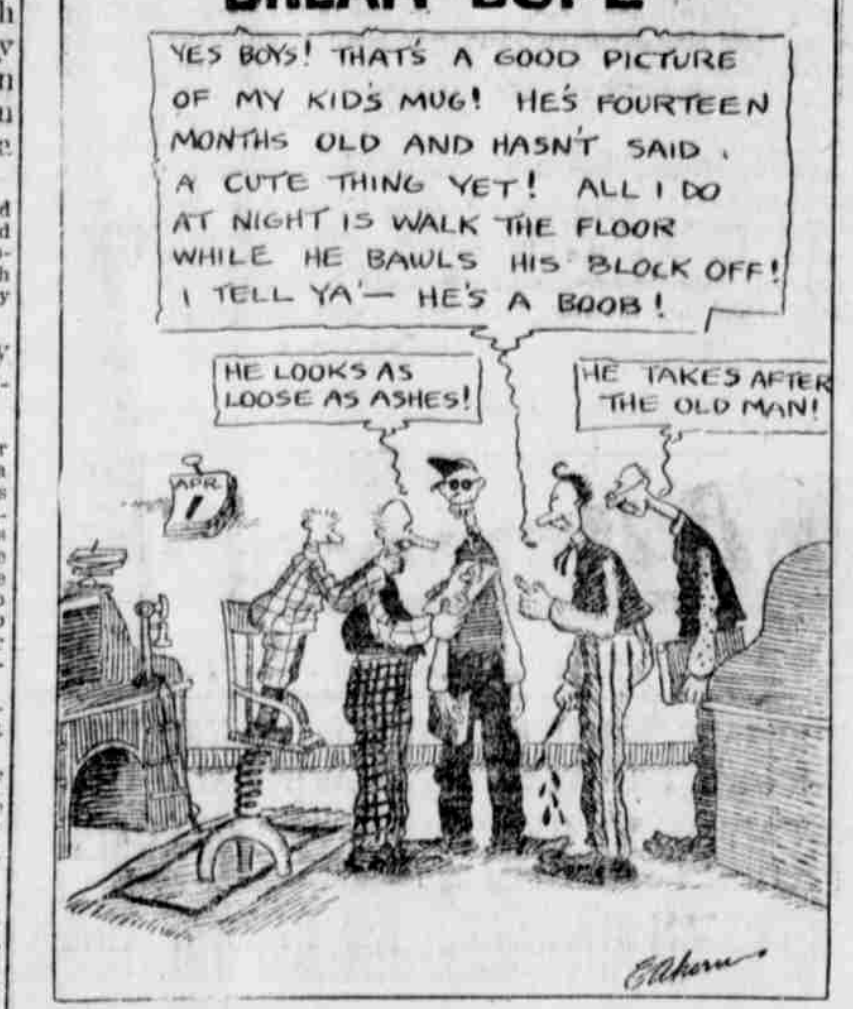
WILSON OFF TO VOTE

CARGO OF FLOUR FOR STARVING ALBANIANS

NEW YORK, Sept. 28.—The sailing ship Albania left this port today for Avlona carrying a cargo of flour for the relief of the people of Albania, some of whom are reported to be starving.

The cargo was contributed by the committee of mercy, the Ohio commission for the relief of European war sufferers and the Albania relief fund. The Italian government has given instructions for the safe passage of the Albania through the blockaded waters of the Adriatic.

GENERAL STRIKE IN CHICAGO SWEAT SHOPS

CHICAGO, Sept. 28.—A general strike of all workers in the men's clothing industry in Chicago was on today. Between 20,000 and 25,000 men and women will not return to their benches in the 400 shops, union leaders said.

The call for a general strike was issued last night after the manufacturers had declined to make overtures to bring about peace.

PASSENGER TRAIN SMASHES TRACKMEN

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 28.—Five men were instantly killed and eleven others were injured, six probably fatally, in a tunnel on the Philadelphia Reading railway at Phoenixville, Pa. here today when a passenger train rushed through a big gang of trackmen. The men killed and injured were all foreigners.

The train bore down upon the men so quickly that they had no time to escape.

MILITARY FUNERAL FOR VICTIMS OF SUBMARINE F-4

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—Full military honors today were accorded four unidentified victims who lost their lives when the United States submarine F-4 mysteriously sank in the entrance to Honolulu harbor some months ago. Their dismembered bodies, in four caskets, were buried in the Arlington national cemetery, the services being attended by high officials of the navy and others. As the flag-draped caskets were drawn along Pennsylvania avenue from the Washington navy yard to Arlington, thousands of civil war veterans and others lined the street and uncovered their heads in reverence.

The bodies, which were recovered only recently after having been submerged for months, were in such condition as to make their individual identification impossible. There were twenty-one men aboard the submarine. Four bodies were identified and buried elsewhere. The names of the seventeen unidentified, including three whose bodies never were recovered, are given by the navy department as follows:

Officers—Lieutenant Alfred L. Ede, Reno, who commanded the F-4, and Ensign Timothy A. Parker of Kentucky. Enlisted men—Clark G. Buck, Tacoma, Wash.; Ernest C. Canvin, New Orleans; Harley Colville, Seattle; Walter F. Covington, Fort Worth, Tex.; George O. Deeth, Portland, Or.; Aliston Grindle, San Francisco; Edwin S. Hill, Etowah, Tenn.; Francis M. Hughson, Los Angeles, Cal.; Alfred Jennie, Festus, Mo.; Archie H. Langer, Erie, Pa.; Horace L. Moore, Germantown, Pa.; William S. Nelson, New York; Frank G. Pierard, Lavern, Cal.; Henry A. Withers, San Diego, Cal., and Frederick Killman, St. Louis.

The funeral escort was composed of all the regular troops and blue-jackets in this vicinity.
