A. S. Bilton, formerly proprietor of the Medford Mail, was interviewing our business men and women with regard to the product of the Medford Flouring Mill last Saturday.

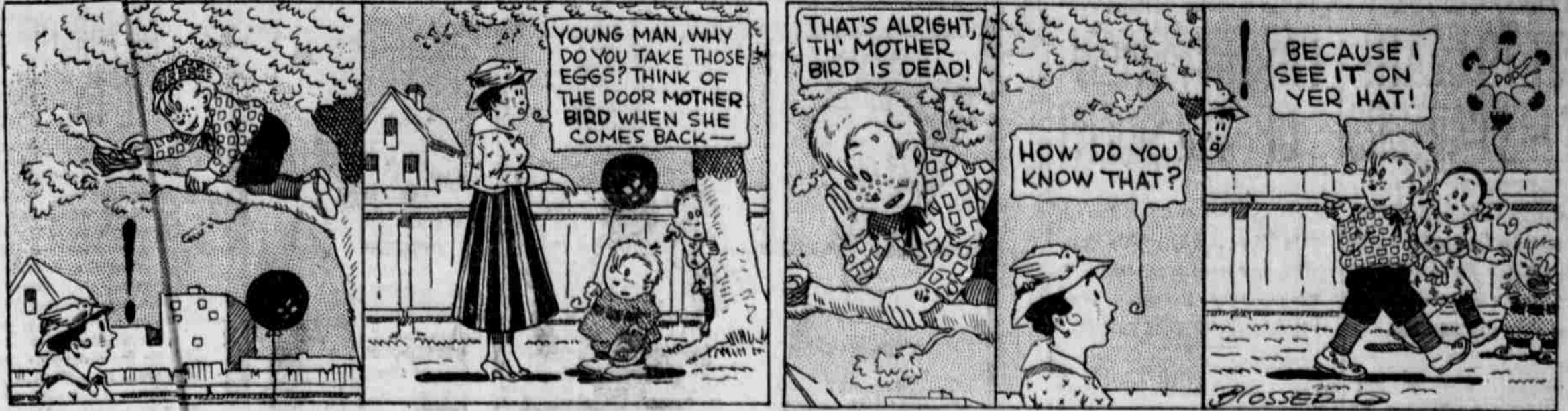
