

### PRESIDENT WILL VOTE FOR VOTES TOWOMEN OCT. 19

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—President Wilson will vote for the woman suffrage state constitutional amendment in New Jersey, his home state, at the special election Oct. 19. He said today he would vote, not as the leader of the democratic party, but as a private citizen.

Mr. Wilson said he believed the question should not be made a party issue, and should be decided by the states, not the national government. The following statement was given out at the white house:

"I intend to vote for woman suffrage in New Jersey because I believe that the time has come to extend that privilege and responsibility to the women of the state, but I shall vote, not as the leader of my party in the nation, but only upon my private conviction as a citizen of New Jersey, called upon by the legislature of the state to express his convictions at the polls. I think that New Jersey will be greatly benefitted by the change.

"My position with regard to the way in which this great question should be handled is well known. I believe that it should be settled by the states and not by the national government and that in no circumstances should it be made a party question, and my view has grown stronger at every turn of the agitation."

Secretaries Garrison, McAdoo, Redfield and Wilson, who also will vote on the question in the near future, have declared in favor of equal suffrage.

### TEUTONS OBJECT TO USE OWN METHODS

BERLIN, Oct. 6. The official statement from German army headquarters under date of Oct. 5 contains the following:

"Russian patrols are wearing German helmets in order to deceive German troops. It is evident that such Russians when they fall into German hands will be treated in accordance with the laws of war."

The foregoing was omitted from yesterday's official statement received from Berlin by way of London, apparently having been eliminated by the British censor.

### DISABLED DESTROYER REACHES NEWPORT

NEWPORT, R. I., Oct. 6.—The torpedoed destroyer Cummings, on board of which two men were burned as a result of an explosion and fire at sea yesterday, arrived here early today. The men, George Trutillo, a first-class fireman, of James, N. M., and Thomas Shea, a water tender of Paterson, N. J., were taken to the naval hospital, where, it is said, they will recover. The destroyer was only slightly damaged.

An investigation into the cause of the accident will begin today.

The fleet of battleships which came into Narragansett bay yesterday in the course of their operations as part of the defending fleet in the war game, put to sea again during the night.

Mr. and Mrs. Caulfield are both graduates of the University of Oregon, at which institution they became acquainted. Mrs. Caulfield was last year teacher in the high school of this city and Mr. Caulfield is engaged in the banking business with his father in Oregon City. The Caulfields belong to one of the early pioneer families of the state of Oregon and have been prominent leaders in the political, business and religious life of this state.

Only the parents of the bride and groom and an aunt of the bride were witnesses of the ceremony that made the young people husband and wife.

These young people, so well qualified for life and with such bright prospects before them, carry with them the best wishes of their many friends in all parts of the state. They will make their home in Oregon City.

### SHOT AT SHADOW, AGED MUSICIAN IS FOUND DEAD

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 6.—Oreste Pardini, a saloonkeeper, fired three shots at the silhouette of a man against his bedroom window when he was awakened early today, according to his statement to the police, upon the supposition that the man was a burglar. Pardini was arrested pending further investigation.

Outside the window was found the body of a middle-aged man, dead, with an old violin in a case beside him.

One policeman recognized the body as that of a wandering musician for whom he had rented a lodging for the night a few days ago.

In the violin case was a paper on which was written, "Repaired by H. Jenkins, Portland, Or., 1914." The initials "H. L." were found in the man's coat. The man was about 45 years old, five feet eight inches tall, weighed about 150 pounds and appeared to have been a foreigner.

### ROCKEFELLER VISITS WYOMING MINE

SUNRISE, Wyo., Oct. 6.—John D. Rockefeller, Jr., arrived here today for an inspection of the Sunrise iron mine of the Colorado Fuel & Iron company. About 300 men are employed in the Sunrise mine. The miners have not been organized under the mediation plan, but it is expected that the Rockefeller industrial plan will be extended to Sunrise later.

### NEW PLANET DISCOVERED PISCES CONSTELLATION

BARCELONA, Spain, Oct. 6, via Paris, 9:15 a. m.—Professor Solai, director of the observatory at Barcelona university, has announced that he discovered on September 15 a new planet in the Pisces constellation. The planet has a rather rapid retrograde movement. Professor Solai is studying it carefully and hopes soon to be able to give further details regarding his discovery.

### MACHADO NAMED PORTUGAL PRESIDENT

LISBON, Oct. 6, 5 a. m., via Paris, 11:15 a. m.—Dr. Bernardino Machado took the oath as president of the republic today, succeeding Theodore Phil Braga. In an address Dr. Machado pledged his administration to devote itself to internal and external defense. He assumed office on the fifth anniversary of the proclamation of the republic.

### TEST INVENTION TO LOCATE FOE IN DARK ON SEA

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—Edward F. Chandler, inventor of a system of harbor defense now being tested by the United States navy by the detection of the approach of submarines and battleships with the aid of water microphones, announced today that he has perfected a method of detecting and locating airships by the microphone. Mr. Chandler said that one of the greatest applications of the airship finder would be as a defense against night raids such as the Germans have made upon London.

Mr. Chandler said that he could easily discover the range, height, speed and direction of a dirigible or other aircraft in the darkest night. Then, the raid, aircraft guns could be used against the invaders.

Mr. Chandler said two governments now at war had approached him to obtain the rights to his invention.

### SALONIKI GREET'S FRENCH FORCES

PARIS, Oct. 6.—French transports arrived at Saloniki Friday night and troops began to land Saturday afternoon, says an Athens dispatch to the Matin. Perfect order was maintained in the city and the inhabitants gave the French soldiers a cordial reception.

Reports received in Athens, the Matin's correspondent says, state that 3000 German and Austrian officers have taken over the principal commands in the Bulgarian army.

### ARABIC HELD AS GREAT VICTORY OF WILSON'S POLICY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—Germany's disavowal of responsibility for the sinking of the Arabic, with accompanying assurances that the possibility of another such incident had been precluded through stringent instructions to submarine commanders, was regarded by officials of the Washington government today as one of the most gratifying results secured by American diplomacy since the European war began.

The crisis in the relations between the United States and Germany is regarded as passed. All that now remains to the Arabic case is the fixing of the indemnity. That phase will be taken up at a conference, at a date yet to be determined, between Secretary Lansing and the German ambassador.

The next feature of the issue to be taken up will be the Lusitania case.

### CARBON SPECULATION SHOWS IN OPENING

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—Measures taken by the stock exchange yesterday to curb riotous speculation in war shares resulted in an irregular opening today. Some of those issues, especially Continental Can, Railway Steel Springs, Republic Steel, General Electric and Goodrich, were down 1 to 2 points, while Industrial Alcohol, American Coal Products, American Car and Distillers securities were that much higher. United States Steel on an offering of 4000 shares, was held a point lower at 78 3/8.
