INVASION OF SERBIA BEGUN

(Continued from Page One.)

Bulgaria. The cabinet crisis has in no manner impeded the landing of allied troops at Saloniki, and the fact that these forces are on Greek soil is considered the best guarantee that Greece ultimately must align herself with the entente powers, with which Premier-Eleas Zaimis is in sympathy. Champagne, in the west, and Dvinsk, in the east, are now the scenes of the struggles most likely to bring decisive results. The Germans still are engaged in concentrating against Dvinsk, evidently bent on a supreme effort to take the city. The Russians, however, are delivering hard blows all along the line, and the British and French press professes to see general Russian "recovery," for which the activities of the allies in the west are given credit.

GERMANS REPULSED

The French report states that the Germans bombarded violently last night all the French front to the north of La Scarpe, and at the same time delivered four counter-attacks against the positions recently conquered by the French near Senehez. They were repulsed at all points.
