NO DISMISSAL OF CASES FROM COLORADO STRIKE

DENVER, Oct. 8 .- More than 1000 sersons made defendants in cases growing out of the recent coal strike in Colorado must go to trial. Hope held out strongly during the past week that Governor George A. Carlson would order a sweeping dismissal of the cases pending, flickered out at midnight when the chief executive refused t interfere. This decision was the culmination of a series of conferences between Governor Carlson, labor leaders, state officials, advisers and citizens. Amnog those who were understood to have favored dismissal was John D. Rockefeller, Jr., now in Colorado on a tour of investigation.

The decision of Governor Carlson, which was a surprise to even those in circles close to the administration, came only a few hours after the announcement of the action of the supreme court, ordering the release of John R. Lawson, labor leader and one of the feremost figures in the conduct of the recent strike, who has been confined in a Trinidad Jail since his conviction several months ago of first degree murder in connection with strike disorders.


