

STILL CIRCULATING RECALL PETITIONS FOR COUNCILMEN

Petitions for the recall for the four councilmen who voted against the petition to place the Medynski petition on the ballot at special election were still being circulated today, yet enough names being secured as yet to present. Nine petitions are in circulation, four of them being in the hands of A. C. Abrams, D. H. Little, J. F. Goodhue and Will H. Wilson. It was announced this afternoon that they would be circulated until the legal number of names was secured, or they failed. The highest number of names required for the petition is 24, but despite this small number, two days' work has failed to bring them. Backers of the recall propaganda declare there is a strong sentiment in favor of it.

There is still a cloud over the percentage of the recalls, none caring to assume the full responsibility. Councilman Medynski states that he was misrepresented in being quoted as saying that D. Fehls instigated the recall petitions and that he merely referred inquirers to Mr. Fehls, who had drawn the petitions up. Mr. Fehls states that he drew up the recall petitions at the request of citizens headed by J. S. Howard, and that he has no other interest in them. It is reported that a council meeting will be called for tonight.

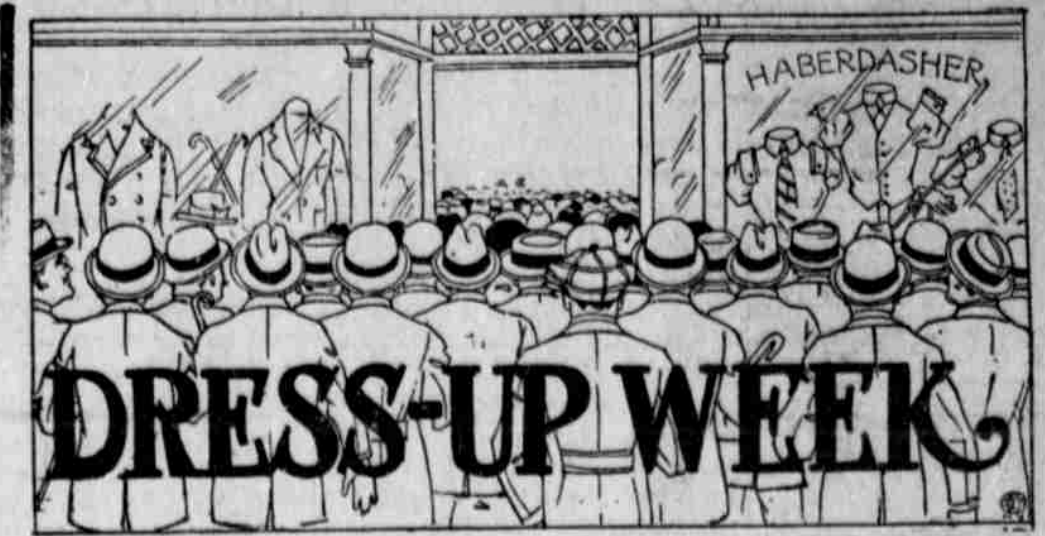
