

CROWELL HEADS PEACE COMMITTEE ON BONDING PLAN

Further steps towards the adjustment of the paving debt controversy was made today with the appointment of a committee composed of Judge W. S. Crowell, as chairman, and Attorney W. E. Phelps, Dr. E. B. Pickett, H. U. Lumsden, and George Trechler to remodel the Miles bonding plan. The first meeting will be held tomorrow night. Wednesday night the committee will meet with the four councilmen favoring the Miles plan. The matter will then be placed before the council for approval and placing on the ballot with the Medyski scheme for a vote of the people. The committee was appointed pursuant to the will of the meeting of citizens and councilmen held last Friday. It is confidently expected that the above action will be the means of solving Medford's financial problems.

None of the recall petitions launched last week have as yet been filed with the city clerk, and it is the consensus of opinion that they should be squelched. It is not considered likely they will be filed, as some kind of a compromise will likely be affected. Circulation of the petitions, however, is still under way.

CHANDLER DENIES CONSPIRACY CHARGES

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 11.—Harry C. Chandler, president of the California-Mexico Land & Cattle company, and assistant general manager of the Los Angeles Times, indicted with others by a federal grand jury here February 19 last, charged with being implicated in an alleged conspiracy to promote a revolution in Mexico, filed an application today in the United States district court asking for a bill of particulars and entering a general denial to the charges. United States District Judge Oscar A. Trippet postponed the hearing on the application upon the motion of C. R. Moody, assistant United States district attorney.

PRESIDENT SAYS NATION AVOIDS WAR TO PRESERVE PEACE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—President Wilson, speaking today at the 25th anniversary meeting of the Daughters of the American Revolution declared the United States should keep out of the European war, not to avoid trouble, but to preserve the foundation upon which peace must be built.

The president spoke upon the duty of Americans to preserve true neutrality and said he believed American citizens should make it plain whether their sympathies for foreign countries came before their love for the United States or whether they were for America, first, last and all the time.

Mr. Wilson urged that every social and political action in the United States should be aimed to get all the people to rally to the standard of America. Some people have wavered from the American ideal, he said, and have sought to aid rival ideals. He added that Americans should devote themselves only to what America believed in.

"We should keep out of the quarrel," he declared. "America has promised the world to pursue a course grounded on justice. We are not trying to keep out of trouble, we are trying to maintain the foundations on which peace must be built. America must preserve the cause of humanity."

FIRE BREAKS OUT ON CANADIAN LINER

VANCOUVER, B. C., Oct. 11.—Fire broke out early this morning aboard the Canadian Pacific liner Montezuma, lying at her wharf here loading cargo preparatory to sailing tomorrow for Yokohama. Every fireman in Vancouver was summoned, and within an hour the blaze seemed to be under control. But it broke out anew later on and much smoke is rising from her forward holds. The fire is in a shipment of cotton.

The fire is under control. It is estimated that 1500 tons of cargo has been damaged by fire and water. The fire was confined to No. 2 hold, in which were stored large quantities of cotton, cigarettes, canned goods, sewing machines and motor cars. The burned and ruined cargo will be discharged and an examination made of the hull to ascertain if the plating has been buckled. An estimate of the financial loss is not obtainable, but the sum probably will be large.

Cage was shot and killed in his home in a struggle with a man, supposed to be a negro.
