

RED APPLES BIG NEED IN COUNTY'S DISPLAY AT FAIR

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 12.—The Oregon building at the San Francisco exposition is receiving a deluge of second hand exhibits sent down from the several counties and the state fair held in Oregon.

Six weeks ago the peach held the center of the stage, with the southern Oregon booth leading. A few are left. Next came the pears and southern Oregon so distinctly out-distanced all other sections of the state, that one might consider it the only peach exhibiting district.

Now the red apples are coming in and the displays are being brightened up and are looking better than at any other time during the exposition. Coos county sent in some splendid Gravensteins. Eastern Oregon, some good Arkansas Blacks and Ben Davis. The county fairs in the Willamette valley have sent down some good apples, but most of them small lots of almost abnormal sized fruit.

Two distinct earthquake shocks were felt at the building during the evening of Friday, October 8th. One of the county representatives who lives at a hotel near the grounds, had retired. GERMANY REPLIES TO PASSPORT ABUSE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 12.—Secretary Lansing stated today that Ambassador Gerard at Berlin had received and was forwarding by mail a note from the German government which referred to the alleged misuse of American passports, an investigation of which had been under way for several months. The investigation was the result of Secretary Lansing's note of July 28, calling attention to alleged infractions.

It is understood, however, that from previous conferences between Ambassador Gerard and officials at the Berlin foreign office, the German government denies complicity in the misuse of American passports. WANTS FEDERAL PAY FOR MEMBERS NATIONAL GUARD

QUINCY, Ill., Oct. 12.—Federal compensation for members of the National Guard, more thorough military training for college students and the establishment of federal munition factories, and perhaps "another West Point" in the middle west were advocated here today by Governor E. P. Dunne of Illinois as plans for furthering national defense. The governor spoke at the dedication of a new national guard armory and held up the Swiss military system as a model for democratic governments.

Discussing the location of national arsenals and munition factories in the middle west, Governor Dunne said: "But if the National Guardsmen were paid for drilling, I believe that instead of a national guard of 120,000 men we would have from 1,500,000 to 2,000,000 throughout the country."

In conclusion he said: "As between the Chinese republic, with its four hundred million inhabitants, without an efficient army, covering before the militant empire of Japan with its seventy million people, and the little republic of Switzerland standing among the warring nations of Europe and protecting its independence by a trained soldiery, let us rather incline to the fortunate situation of Switzerland."

BOSTON, Oct. 12.—The Boston Americans and the Philadelphia Athletics now battling for the world's championship will go intact to the Pacific coast for a series of games, beginning in San Francisco, October 29, according to arrangements made today by the national commission, the presidents of the two clubs and a representative of the Panama-Pacific exposition. The teams will play in Chicago, Omaha, Denver and Salt Lake City on the way to the coast, and also in Los Angeles and San Diego.
