EL PASO, Texas, Oct. 14.—General Tomas Ornelas, military commander of Juarez, crossed the Rio Grande and retired from the Villa government today, according to reports at the international bridges.

General Benavides, chief of staff

of General Villa, who is in Juarez, said that he, Benavides, had been instructed to escort Ornelas to Casas Grandes for a conference with General Villa. Ornelas was to have been accompanied by a body guard and returned to Juarez in three days. It was denied that Ornelas had crossed to the United States, but he could not be found in Juarez.

GOOD AND EVILS OF FRUIT AUCTIONS

"It is not claimed that the auction system of the largest eastern cities when properly used will do away with the need of jobbers," writes Arthur M. Geary, who is to speak at Medford Saturday afternoon at the public library. "But it will greatly shorten the route from the producers to the consumers. At the present time a large share of the apples of the northwest are sold by the associations through large receiving apple jobbers, who in turn sell to smaller jobbers, who in turn sell to the retailers who in turn finally distribute them among the consumers. The plea of the auction companies is to allow large jobbers and small jobbers and even retailers who handle a sufficient quantity of fruit to have an equal chance at the supply of apples through their public sale system.

GOOD AND EVILS OF FRUIT AUCTIONS

"No wonder there are hundreds of jobbers in the United States who now handle oranges and lemons, pineapples, grapes, pears, plums, prunes and cherries who do not deal in box apples. As several of these small jobbers in Boston, Cincinnati, Cleveland and New York have told me, they do not want to deal through their large rivals who not only sell to them, but also to their customers. The finest package of fruit grown will not find a buyer if it has not a salesman.

"The California and Florida associations of growers insist upon the large jobbers buying their fruit at auction in competition with the smaller jobbers who cannot buy in car load quantities."

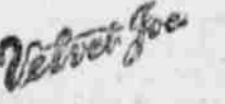
