

WOODS ARRESTED ON FRAUD CHARGE

J. B. Woods, a former real estate dealer of this city, was arrested at Ashland upon a warrant sworn to by H. A. Rawley, for obtaining money under false pretenses. Woods came to town secretly a few days ago, after an extended absence, and was seen by Rawley at the depot as he was boarding a southbound train. He immediately caused a warrant to be issued, and a telephone message to Ashland resulted in his being taken from the train, and placed in the custody of the local authorities.

It is alleged that Rawley gave Wood \$500 with which to pay debts upon mining property in California. Instead of fulfilling this obligation, Woods is alleged to have gone east. The transaction named in the complaint occurred a year ago.

WORK OF FRAMING 50-50 PLAN BEGUN

The work of framing the 50-50 plan for the paying of the city's paving indebtedness, in ordinance form is now ready for submission to the city council at the regular meeting next Tuesday evening. The citizen's committee with the city council will meet Saturday night for a final conference on the ordinance, with Judge W. S. Crowell, chairman. The 50-50 plan will, it is expected, receive the support of five members of the council, when placed on its first reading. There were no new developments today on the recall petitions, all being held in abeyance.

I. W. Thomas of West Main suggests that those who favor the 50-50 plan show their good faith by paying up 50 percent of their assessments at once, without waiting for an election.

JURORS BOX FILLED IN NEW HAVEN TRIAL

On Eastern Front

Although admitting that the forces of General Ivanoff have again been hurled back across the Stripa river in Eastern Galicia, Petrograd asserts the advantage still rests with the Russians, who hold eight miles of the east bank of the river after actions which have virtually separated the Austro-German armies.

Violent actions continue on the Drinsk front with little relative change in the positions of the contending armies.

Additional money to employ more patent examiners also has been asked by Secretary Lane.

COUNCIL AFTER SOUTHERN PACIFIC

According to Chief of Police Hittson the whistling campaign of the Southern Pacific railway is effective only in this city, which happens to have an ordinance regulating the speed of trains within the city limits to eight miles. At Central Point no whistling of trains occurs, though that station is less protected from accidents than Medford. As a reprisal against shrill blasts, the city threatens to place watchmen along the railroad track and line the trains for violation of the ordinance. A quiet investigation has been going on by city officials, and the discovery is made that on passenger trains the flagman gently leans against the rear platform. Thereupon the engineer will emit four or five blasts, and two more in response to the flagman's "high ball." The flagman is supposed to go a half mile from the rear of the train.

Action relative to the jawhacker signs and the whistling nuisance will be taken at the next regular meeting of the city, and a protest against both filed with the Portland and San Francisco offices.

FIREBUG OPERATES ON THOMPSON CREEK

A firebug operated on Thompson creek in the Applegate district, Thursday afternoon, setting seven fires in about half an hour. His trail was followed down the creek, setting five fires on one side and two on the other. Forestry officials are working on the plan of using bloodhounds in capturing the arsonists, and they will be given a trial in southern Oregon next summer. They will use the best scents obtainable, and the purchase of both Siberian and Kentucky bloodhounds will be made to see which breed does the best work. Chief of Police Hittson, who is an authority on bloodhounds, maintains that they are not feasible, owing to the inability to follow a trail over dry ground.

TURKS VICTORIOUS REPELLING ALLIES

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 15.—An official statement issued tonight at the Turkish war office was as follows:

"Near Anafarta we inflicted heavy losses on the enemy by the use of bombs. Our fire damaged an enemy aeroplane which fell east of Tuslarool and finally was destroyed by our artillery.

"Our artillery destroyed an enemy machine gun position near Ari Burnu.

"Our observation detachments near Seddul Bahr, inflicted heavy losses on the enemy's right wing after a surprise attack with hand grenades Tuesday night. A mine exploded before his left wing destroyed a considerable part of the enemy's trenches.

"Enemy torpedo boats and coast batteries vainly bombarded our artillery. Near Seddul Bahr our artillery forced torpedo boats which were bombarding our left wing, to leave the narrow."
