RUTH ST. DENIS' DANCING REACHES APEX OF THE ART

About 450 B. C. the Greeks, like the present-day civilization, were well to the front on military exploits. They had the same love for the Trojans that William Holmstrom has for Kitchener. But along came one Pericles, a good democrat, who had an eye for the beautiful, and diverted the war indignity from its gory, use into the channels of art, science and literature, and produced what is known as "The Age of Pericles." It was the first and last time that this experiment has ever been tried, although it gave the world a model for art, architecture and literature that has never been surpassed.

The performance last night of Miss St. Denis and her company was the very apex of art. The dances were a series of postures and groupings, dissolving from one form to another to the time of music. It is really not an entertainment that appeals to the unthinking, but charms those who would be fascinated by a gallery of great paintings and sculptured art. In fact, it is great statues and statuettes in motion. It is a revival of the art of nearly 3000 years ago.

The costumes and scenery were correct. They gave us the dances not only of ancient Greece, but also of primitive Egypt and India. While many of the dancers appeared with feet and legs bare, there was not the least suggestion of sensuality. There is no sensuality in true art.

In brief, Medford has witnessed an entertainment of the highest type and the new management is to be congratulated on so good a beginning.
