BAPTISTS PLAN STATE ORGANIZATION

EUGENE, Or., Oct. 20.—An organization of the men in the Baptist church, to be statewide in scope, will be perfected at a banquet to be held in Eugene tonight in connection with the annual state convention of Baptists now in session. The object of this organization will be to assist in the success of the "five-year objective" plan, adopted by the northern Baptist convention, which includes 1,000,000 new members; the placing of 5000 missionaries in the field; \$2,000,000 endowment fund for the ministers and missionaries' benefit board; \$6,000,000 for additional educational endowment and equipment, and an annual income of \$6,000,000 for missionaries and benevolences.

These objectives of the church as outlined is the central theme of the convention now in session. The giving of not less than one-tenth of the income is proposed for its accomplishment, so far as finances are concerned.

MOONSHINERS PLEAD GUILTY

FORT SMITH, Ark., Oct. 20.—Seven men on trial charged with conspiracy to defraud the government in the manufacture of moonshine whiskey, pleaded guilty in the United States district court here today. Sentence will be passed tomorrow. The case against Fred Bowles of Fort Smith, the eighth defendant, was dismissed. The cases against the defendants went to trial yesterday, and their action today was a surprise.

ASQUITH'S CONDITION REPORTED SATISFACTORY

LONDON, Oct. 20.—The condition of Premier Asquith, who was suddenly taken ill yesterday, was described by his physicians at noon today as satisfactory. The following bulletin was given out: "The prime minister passed a satisfactory night. His condition improved. He will be confined to his room all day."

that newspapers in the United States were quoting leaders of the Catholic party in Mexico as saying that a recognition of the Carranza government was an insult to the Catholic church. "This message adds," said Carranza, "that they hold us responsible for the assassinations in the churches."

The first chief smiled as he laid down the sheet, saying: "I will leave it to you how many I have killed. All the Catholics that have been punished have been punished because they have taken part in politics."

Regarding his choice for an American ambassador, he said he would welcome any one the United States sent, but added that a man should be sent who was familiar with Mexico and her internal affairs.

MEDYNSKI PLAN WINS BY AID OF CITY ATTORNEY

The 50-50 rebounding plan for the paying indebtedness was hog tied at the regular meeting of the city council Tuesday night, through an afterthought by City Attorney McCabe, who ruled that it could not be submitted to a vote of the people with the Medynski scheme. Before giving this decision he opined that both could stand upon their own feet. In accordance, the Medynski plan was read, and approved. Then the 50-50 plan was read and approved. Then City Attorney McCabe declared that the council's action upon the last approved plan was invalidated by the action of the approval of the Medynski plan, and proved his contention by producing the city charter. The news stupefied the supporters of the 50-50 plan, who adjourned until tonight to reconsider the proposition.

Councilman Hargreave charged that City Attorney McCabe double crossed the majority of the council. In his enthusiasm for the Medynski plan, and that a trap was laid and executed with some skill. All Attorney McCabe said was that he was following the law, and that if there was a trap he knew nothing about it. Judge Crews spoke in favor of the Medynski plan, and urged that they be voted upon separately. He left before Attorney McCabe's final decision was made upon the matter. The city attorney also charged that the majority of the council ignored him until last night.

The council will hold a meeting tonight in an effort to find a way out of the difficulty, and save the 50-50 plan, but the chances seem slim. The Medynski plan has an ace in the hole, and is going to keep it there.

USE ZEPPELINS TO PROTECT COMMERCE

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 20.—Zeppelins are being used by Germany for the defense of commerce against attacks by British and Russian submarines, according to a dispatch from Berlin. It is stated that the steamer Scotia of Stettin, Prussia, bound from Sweden to Stettin with a cargo of ore, was pursued by a British submarine off Bornholm. In reply to wireless calls for assistance, a Zeppelin suddenly appeared, whereupon the submarine submerged and disappeared.

GERMANY ROUNDS UP SPIES IN BELGIUM

LONDON, Oct. 20.—Recently there has been a sweeping roundup of spies and suspects of various kinds by the German authorities in Belgium, according to messages from the Dutch frontier. It is said there have been hundreds of arrests and scores of executions. The roundup followed the beginning of the Anglo-French activity on the western front. General von Bissing issued a long proclamation containing references

to "attempts by Belgians to endanger the safety of the German army," and threatening penalties of the utmost severity against any person detected committing offenses against the specially devised code of regulations for the conduct of civilians.

Immediately after this proclamation came a series of wholesale arrests in various parts of the country, including many persons of high social standing, who were accused either of espionage or assisting in the escape of Belgian, French or English persons. There followed also, it is said,

numerous military trials for the arrested civilians, the result of which is known in only a few cases.
