FORTUNATE CENTRAL POINT

THE most effective way to secure prosperity is to increase production of the soil and to establish industries that utilize the products produced and furnish pay-rolls.

The way to increase our productivity is to secure irrigation, which will eliminate the gamble from farming and be crop insurance.

The way to establish the industry that utilizes our products is to furnish the required acreage needed for sugar beets.

The people of the Central Point district are fortunate in that they have the opportunity to secure both irrigation and the sugar factory, and make this favored region the most prosperous in the valley.

Three thousand acres signed up for water will secure the expenditure of \$250,000 in an irrigation system that will cover 30,000 acres. The same amount of acreage signed up for beets would, in all likelihood, secure the factory, which business sense would locate where the greatest acreage existed.

Three thousand acres irrigated next season will mean double that amount the next year, and an ever-increasing amount in the years to come.

The Central Point region is fortunate. While other parts of the valley are frantically chasing irrigation rainbows, real water is being shoved at it. While other sections are running after will-o'-the-wisp bonding schemes to tax themselves into a little spare change, real development schemes that mean abiding prosperity are within their grasp.

A TEMPORARY SETBACK

ADVOCATES of equal suffrage should not be discouraged by the fact that the suffrage amendment was defeated in the special election held in New Jersey. It is only one of the many temporary defeats that always mark the onward march of progress.

It is only a question of time until equal suffrage becomes universal. It is and will be opposed by Tories, just as every reform is. It will eventually triumph, because it is right, and the cause of the righteous always prevails.

Success for suffrage depends upon education, and education is gradual. It is a matter of evolution, not of revolution. The result in New Jersey simply shows that the people of New Jersey are not yet ready for suffrage—that they are still bound by the ties of convention.

Who are the opponents of suffrage? Big business, political corruption, the liquor interests, organized vice and the Tories who constitutionally oppose innovation. The same opposition is arraigned against workmen's compensation, corporation regulation, social and industrial justice, initiative and referendum—against all political progress.

Every argument against votes for women applies equally against votes for men. The fight for manhood suffrage was a long and bitter one. Over a century ago Thomas Jefferson accomplished the abolition of property qualification—let us hope that Woodrow Wilson may yet secure the abolition of sex qualification.

INFORMATION UPON ELECTRIC SERVICE

An edition of 12,000 copies of a booklet giving general information on electric service is being mailed by the California-Oregon Power company to all its customers in Oregon and California.

This booklet gives information regarding electric cooking and heating; how to read electric meters; the care and use of electric lamps and full data regarding rates and services.

It also gives valuable data about electric pumping and irrigation, care and operation of centrifugal pumps with tables of horsepower required for pumps at various lifts.

The booklet also describes the service departments of the company, whose duty it is to furnish estimates and information regarding the various branches of electric service, including electric lighting, electric power, electric pumping for irrigation and electric cooling and heating.

CITIES MUST PAY COUNTY ROAD TAX FOR DISTRICT USE

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 20.—Upholding the contention of the commissioners of Multnomah county that section 6313, L. O. L., as amended by chapter 194, page 253, General Laws of Oregon, 1915, which gives the board authority to divide the county into "suitable and convenient road districts," without any limitation as to their extent, should rule, the supreme court has dismissed the application of William F. Brady for a writ to compel the commissioners to follow the commissioners to follow another section.

Brady sought to have the board compelled to constitute the city of Portland a separate road district, pursuant to section 6313, L. O. L., as amended by section 1 of chapter 127, page 155, General Laws of Oregon, 1915.

In upholding chapter 194, the supreme court says that inasmuch as it was passed later than chapter 127, and is the last expression of the legislature, it holds good.

"If the constitution is given any effect, section 6313 as last amended as all of section 6313 as it now stands," says the supreme court. "There can be but one section 6313 of Lord's Oregon Laws. If the first amendment as passed in 1913, and the last amendment, chapter 194, had passed just as it reads, no one would have contended that the proviso making separate road districts out of cities, omitted in

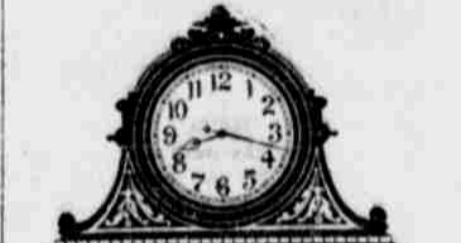
