GERMAN PRESS ASK RECALL OF BRAND WHITLOCK

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—Berlin dispatches reflecting published statements in Germany demanding the recall of Brand Whitlock, American minister to Belgium, because of his reports on the execution of Miss Edith Cavell, the British nurse, today attracted attention of administration officials here, but elicited no comment further than statements that the United States had no official intimation from Germany that Mr. Whitlock no longer was acceptable.

The German dispatches made a point of the fact that the seat of the Belgian government no longer is at Brussels, but at Havre, and suggested that Mr. Whitlock should be at the latter place.

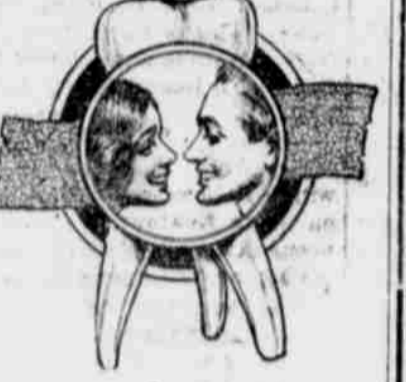
