WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—Count von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, and Secretary Lansing had their first conversation today since the settlement of the Arabic case and took under consideration the questions growing out of the sinking of the Lusitania last May with the loss of more than 100 American lives.

The plan of reaching an agreement without the exchange of formal notes, but by informal conversations worked so well in the handling of the Arabic case that it is now to be followed in endeavoring to solve the Lusitania problem.

Although today was but the first of what probably will be a long series of parleys on the subject, there was a noticeable feeling of confidence that an agreement ultimately would be reached and that there would be no new crisis near the situation.

WILMINGTON, Del., Nov. 2.—Fourteen persons injured in a portable explosion at Carney's Point, N. J., were brought to Wilmington hospitals today. It is said others were injured, but the number is not known. Details have not yet been received at Dupont Powder company offices here.

two and one half million officers and men had been carried, in addition to 320,000 sick and wounded, 2,500,000 tons of supplies and 800,000 horses and mules.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—Virginia and Tennessee tobacco growers complained to Secretary Lansing today that because of restrictions of the British government, practically all of the 1914 tobacco crop and much of the 1915 crop still are in warehouses. They asked that special representations be made to Great Britain to permit the free and unrestricted movement of tobacco from the United States to neutral ports.

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cleared the whole high seas from one end to the other of German warships and mercantile marine. Where is the great German fleet upon which so much money was spent? Locked up in the Baltic. It dare not show its face in waters where it can be attacked. The whole maritime resources of Germany have been reduced to sporadic and constantly diminishing efforts of submarines.

In the Dardanelles In referring to the situation at the Dardanelles, Mr. Asquith pointed out that the allied forces were holding up 200,000 Turks, and added:

"The situation in the Dardanelles is receiving the most anxious consideration of the government, not as an isolated thing, but as part of the larger strategic question raised by reason of developments in the Balkans."

In regard to the western front, Mr. Asquith said he had nothing to add to the dispatches from Field Marshal French, except to say that, on balance, since last April the Germans had not gained a single foot of ground.

Referring to the eastern war theater, the premier paid a warm tribute to the fighting qualities of the Russians, and expressed confidence in their ability, "before long to roll back the enemy."

Object in Mesopotamia As to Mesopotamia, Mr. Asquith remarked, the British object was to preserve the neutrality of the Arabs, safeguard British interests in the Persian gulf and uphold the authority of the union jack in the east.

Turning to the operations in the Dardanelles, for the launching of which Winston Spencer Churchill, then first lord of the admiralty, was attacked so strongly in many quarters, Mr. Asquith said:

"From the moment Turkey declared war it was impossible to concentrate attention solely on the western front. The Turk's threatened our Russian allies and Egypt. The advent of Turkey produced a great effect on the Balkan states, and the government had to face a question which was not merely strategic."
