ASHLAND AND VICINITY

By a score of 20 to 0 the Ashland football team put it over the Klamath Falls squad on home grounds Friday afternoon. Leslie Cunningham was acting captain of the locals. Bentley, Ashland fullback, made the phenomenal plays of the struggle. The referee was selected from the ranks of the visitors, and Sayles, of Ashland, was umpire. Results in the series thus far during the season indicate Ashland's superior playing over both Grants Pass and Klamath, in each instance high plus scores having been made as compared to minus cipher ones to the credit of outsiders. Business houses closed during the recent game. D. M. Lowe and H. O. Frohbach are winning encomiums and the former not a few medals in connection with district and county exhibits at the big shows. In addition to rewards of merit at San Francisco, Lowe has scored several touchdowns at Salem and Portland, his Jackson county display in the latter city being unrivaled. The Ashland public market which follows the example of Eugene, may be to the effect that left-over, unmarketable stuff which products are nevertheless not spoiled, shall be donated to public charity purposes. British royalty was represented here Sunday morning when the Marquis and Marchioness of Aberdeen passed through on the Shasta limited, bound for San Francisco. There were six in the party, including three servants. The marquis was formerly Lord Lieutenant of Ireland and is prominent in the British peerage. The marchioness is identified internationally with the universal suffrage movement and will preside at the national conference of women's clubs in the exposition city. Archie Eubanks figured in a "lost" episode Sunday morning while out on a hunting trip with Chester Stevenson. The hunters became separated, Archie got lost, but was found by a scouting party at 2 a. m. at the Dunlap cabin, Wagner creek locality. The new city jail of steel and reinforced concrete was dedicated last Friday morning at 10:45 o'clock with inappropriate exercises, in the presence of a police squad and members of the fire department. Jim Murphy, alias Chris Vogel, and who also travels under various other pseudonyms, had the dishonor of being the first prisoner to be locked up in the new structure. He was charged with some sort of petty misdemeanor without extenuating circumstances. Local educators are interested in the report that the higher grades of the Salem schools will be available for military training. Also that the Klamath county high school, commercial department, will be open to night sessions on and after November 1 to those students who are either past school age or are busy at other activities during the daylight hours. The government is continuing to furnish headstones as markers for the last resting place of veterans of the Spanish-American war. Local survivors of that conflict attend to the placing of these tributes of respect which are appropriately lettered. Two of these reached Ashland recently, to be placed over the graves of Frank and Morris Howell, sons of Mrs. Kate Howell and brothers of Emerson Howell, residents of this city. The boys served respectively in Company L and Company B of the Second Oregon. Although they did not die overseas, they were nevertheless victims of the effects of the Philippine climate, after their return to the homeland. Five other veterans of the same war are buried in local cemeteries, their names being Herbert Applegate, J. Taylor, Milt Gregory, P. Strange and Lester High. Bert R. Greer returned from an extended visit to San Francisco Saturday morning and immediately the springs commission went into emergency executive session. The wages for assault and battery, even if not for a more serious offense, appear to be a dollar a day in Yreka, as is indicated by the recent conviction there of Mart Moran, who vic-

iously assaulted Conductor Reeves of the Southern Pacific, living in this city. Moran was fined \$90 or 90 days in jail, and elected to accept the latter penalty. Mrs. W. H. Last Friday afternoon railroad yards were filled with hogs, sheep and goats, prizewinners at the state fair, on the way to San Francisco, due there November 1. About twenty carloads were in the lot. "Pacific Chief," a Duroc-Jersey hog, owned by C. A. Hoover of Gervais, weighed 700 pounds. F. R. Steel of Winona ranch, near Grants Pass, had Berkshire hogs headed by "Big Four," a grand champion. J. M. Fruits of Enterprise, had Hampshire swine and a prize lot of Angoras from Monmouth got John Stump's goat. Local exhibitors are planning entries for the Oregon Poultry and Pet Stock Show, which will be held in Portland, December 6-11, 1915. The contract for building the new schoolhouse in district 54, Dead Indian section, was let to Frank Fitch of this city, and he is now at work on the job. The price was approximately \$650. There were three bidders. Ashland delegates to the recent state convention of Federated Women's clubs at Salem report that the proposition looking towards the adoption of the "Polynurial," a composite scheme for the standardization of women's apparel, never got beyond its first reading and was voted down overwhelmingly.
