OVER-EDUCATION CURSE OF CHILD LIFE

OAKLAND, Cal., Nov. 5.—That children should not be sent to school until they are 10 years old is the claim of Luther Burbank.

"The work of breaking down the nervous systems of the children of the United States is well under way," said he. "It is abnormal and cruel to run all children through the same

for the mind of a person 25 years old is the height of folly. "Do not dress the children in costly clothing. An over-dressed child is as badly off as an under-dressed child. You cannot raise a healthy child or a healthy plant under a glass roof.

"On the food a child is fed the first ten years of its life depends its moral nature. How can we feed the poor? The feeding of the poor can be done nationally, without paternalism or charity, and a nation in self-defense must take care of its people.

"There is not an attribute lacking in a plant that cannot be bred into it. The same is largely true of human nature. Heredity will make it self felt first, but in child-rearing, heredity and environment are equally important. What, then, can we expect from children raised in dusty factories, crowded tenements and unventilated schools? We let the weeds grow and then set fire to them by bad environment.

"What about the human will?" you ask. The most stubborn thing in the world is a plant whose habits have been acquired in aeons of time. Yet that plant's will can be easily broken by crossing it with another plant. The human will is a weak thing compared to a plant's will. Imagine, then, what possibilities there are for good and evil in such a sensitive thing as a child.

The child is 10,000 times as sensitive as the most sensitive of plants. Children should be raised under the same principles as are exercised in the production of plants. Over-education is the curse of child life in America.

To the Editor: My attention has been called to a signed article in the Sun wherein it is charged that the Medford paving assessments are illegal or at least of doubtful validity because of certain ambiguous and unwise amendments to the charter which were prepared by me.

The writer of this article is misinformed. As a matter of fact the provisions of the charter of the city of Medford relating to paving assessments have never been amended in any material particular. At the request of the council I prepared an amendment reducing the number of times of printing the notice of assessment. This was done in the interest of economy, and in no wise affects the procedure or the validity of the assessments. Otherwise the procedure outlined in the charter remains exactly as it was when passed by the legislature in 1905.

These paving assessments, their validity, the validity and sufficiency of the charter provisions for enforcing collection and every other phase of the question have been carefully examined by two of the greatest municipal bond lawyers in the United States. The First National Bank of Cleveland, Ohio, took this double precaution before buying the bonds. They pronounce the assessments valid, enforceable and free from doubt, and the provisions of our charter adequate.

Mr. William D. Fenton, one of the most prominent lawyers of the Pacific coast also made a careful examination of the same matters and came to the same conclusion.

Mr. A. E. Reames of this city examined carefully into the matter for the city council, and in a written opinion which is on file in the city recorder's office announces the same conclusion.

SUBMARINES PASS GIBRALTAR: SINK VESSELS OF ALLIES

PARIS, Nov. 6.—The straits of Gibraltar have again been passed by German submarines, which on Thursday sank two French and one Italian steamship. The crew of one vessel is missing.

The following statement was made by the marine ministry today: "The enemy's submarines, coming from the Atlantic, passed through the Straits of Gibraltar on the night of November 2. They sank on November 4 the French ship Dahra off Arzen, Algeria, and the French ship Calvados, and the Italian ship Ionio near Cape Ivi.

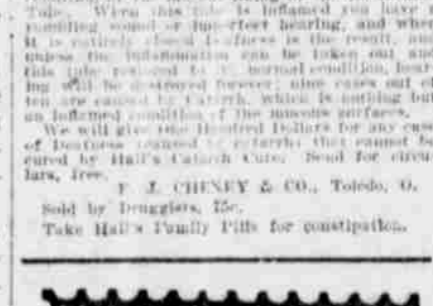
"The crews of the Dahra and the Ionio were saved. There is no news from the crew of the Calvados."
