# Freckles and His Friends IRRIGATION, SUGAR FACTORY TO REVIVE VALLEY OF ROGUE

In the opinion of W. C. Wilkes, as sistant general freight and passenger agent of the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railway system, Rogue River valley is setting a proce which will soon bring southern Oregon back to its former prosperous condition. Lack of rain has caused a shortage of fruit and other crops the last few years, says the Portland Telegram. "Three activities of the people of Rogue River valley will restore good times in southern Oregon," said Mr. Wilkes, who has been making an inspection of the Pacific & Eastern line of the Hill system, running thirtythree miles northeast from Medford. "Probably foremost is the assurance idays, that the valley will see the successful launching of a beet sugar factory in 1916 Contracts for growing beets are being freely signed by land owners. It is believed that through the assistance of C. E. Gates, a Medford man, enough acreage will be signed at 7:30 p. m.

by the Utah promoters. "Of equal importance is the satisfactory progress made on the Pat Welch irrigation project of 25,000 acres. A dam is being creeted to store the water of Fish lake, By raising the height of the dam and making Four Mile lake also a storage reservoir, 30,000 acres additional can be brought under irrigation, insuring fruit and other crops against failure. "And in the third place, a highway will be constructed from the Butte Falls terminus of the Pacific & Eastern to Prospect, connecting with the road to Crater lake, reducing the distance from 80 to 47 miles, and the fare from \$18 to \$9. During this year Crater lake was visited by 12,-000 tourists."
