Aunt controversy over municipal indebtedness of various Oregon towns, the obligations of Ashland in this respect, per official statement, amount to \$450,264.63. Of this amount \$378,500 is represented by municipal bonds under various classifications, including the \$175,000 auxiliary water issue, and \$171,764.63 in Bancroft assessment obligations for which the city stands sponsor. Against these liabilities there is a credit of \$48,087.71 cash on hand. The Ashland school district has \$95,000 outstanding bonds. This entire showing is favorable when compared with various other Oregon towns. Sinking fund requirements are rigidly adhered to in reducing the indebtedness.
