It is said by those who are in position to know that more talk of diversified farming is heard in this valley this season than ever before. The tendency to engage in diversified farming should always be accompanied by knowledge of the fact that diversified productions of the farm, more than any other exertion, absolutely require irrigation. In arid and semi-arid regions it is too generally a failure without a convenient and abundant supply of water for artificial irrigation to be less than a hazardous undertaking. So, it may be assumed that there is a more widespread determination in this valley to encourage the irrigation projects now under consideration than ever before. The reports of preliminary surveys will soon be ready for submission to the farmers and on them they may form a definite idea as to what it will be necessary to do to get the water.
