Dr. J. M. Keene, appointed to fill the vacancy caused by Colonel H. H. Sargent's resignation, was initiated into the mysteries of councilman at the regular monthly meeting Tuesday. The most important topic was consideration of the budget for the coming year, Dr. Keene insisting that the amount raised for interest be raised directly instead of by borrowing from other funds. As outlined, the levy will be 21 mills. Final consideration was postponed until next Tuesday.

A new registration law was considered, whereby one registration would be all required unless the voter changed residence. A \$2 per day wage was voted for members of the election board, who sit ten days from 1:30 p. m. until 7 p. m. Dr. Keene thought \$1.50 sufficient for half a day's work in hard times, and Councilman Amy joined with him, Mayor Emerick casting the deciding vote for the \$2 a day wage.

The joint ordinance provoked some discussion, but went over without action.

The registration board as appointed consists of H. N. Loflan, chairman; Mrs. Amy Dow and Mrs. W. L. Pitt.

A letter from John G. Pierce, former councilman of Seattle, was read, in which Mr. Pierce said he believed he had a solution of the bonding problem in Medford and offered his services either on a commission basis or on a salary. NAVY YARDS BUILD WARSHIPS CHEAPER THAN SHIPYARDS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17.—None of the bids by private yards for the construction of the two super-dreadnaughts authorized by the last congress, submitted to the navy today, fell within the limit of \$7,500,000 fixed as the maximum cost for hull and machinery of each ship.

Bids submitted by the New York, Philadelphia and Mare Island navy yards, however, all fell within the limit, most of them being below \$7,000,000. Three private companies submitted bids for one ship each.

The navy yard estimates were based on full specification for the ships without modifications.

New York figures were: For turbine engines \$7,069,923; for steam and electric drive (similar to the plant designed for the United States ship California) \$6,986,667.

Philadelphia yard: Turbine \$6,916,427; electric \$6,774,144.

Mare Island yard: Turbine \$7,413,156.

New York Ship Building company: Turbine drive \$7,700,000. Time 34 months.

Newport News Ship Building company (A) turbine, as specified, \$7,775,000; time forty months; (B) turbine, alternative type, \$7,765,000. Time forty months.

Roe River Ship Building company: Turbine \$7,638,000; time 34 months.

The navy yard estimates all were based on a 36 months construction period.

RAPID PROGRESS BEING MADE UPON IRRIGATION SYSTEM

The Rogue River Canal company has finished its work for the season at Fish Lake. The dam has been completed and 100 feet of snow has stopped work on the canal connecting Four Mile lake with Fish lake. Approximately \$100,000 has been spent in these improvements, which will enable the storage of abundance of water for next season's irrigation.

The Canal company completed its concrete intake for the Phoenix ditch last night. About 60 per cent of the ditch is completed. The work is being done by contract and will be finished by the first of January. The canal will then carry sufficient water for the irrigation of 5000 acres.

Eight teams and a crew of men are now employed on the Hopkins extension of the canal from Medford to Willow Springs, a distance of 20 miles. The present force is engaged in staking and otherwise laying out the work. The crew will be materially increased next week, when the preliminary work shall have been done.

The company now has 200 men employed enlarging the main canal from Lake creek to Bradshaw drop. The main intake, built of concrete and timber, has been completed. As soon as the force shall have finished work on the sixteen and a half miles now under way, it will be moved to the work on the Hopkins extension to Willow Springs, to which point the work will be hurried to completion.

The entire system is being constructed with great care to make it one of the most substantial and permanent irrigation propositions in the west. Unusual care will be taken to husband the water sources to enable the company to deliver the water to users as late in the season as possible. The record of water supply from the Bear creek source for a period of years shows that there will be abundance of water with which to take proper care of the orchards and vineyards commanded by the canals from that watercourse, insuring also two crops of alfalfa.

GUGGENHEIMS TO DISSOLVE CONCERN IN NEW MERGER

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—The Guggenheim Exploration company, which is a holding company for some of the more important interests represented by the Guggenheims in their various copper mining operations, is to dissolve, according to announcement made today.

The new Kennecott corporation in which the Guggenheims and J. P. Morgan and company are said to have large holdings, will take over the holdings of the Guggenheim Exploration company in Utah copper, giving its own stock in exchange.

Guggenheim Exploration will distribute to its stockholders shares in the Ray Consolidated, Chino, American Smelting and Refining common and Yukon Gold stocks. In addition each share holder of Guggenheim Exploration will receive the option of accepting \$37 cash for each share of the new Kennecott stock.

The Guggenheim Exploration company is a New Jersey corporation and was organized as a holding company with stock interest in various mines and mining properties in Alaska, Canada and the United States, including chiefly Utah Copper, Chino copper, Ray Consolidated copper, Yukon gold and American Smelting and Refining company. The capitalization of the Guggenheim Exploration company is \$22,000,000 and the par value of the stock is \$25.

TUSKEGEE PAYS FINAL TRIBUTE TO NEGRO LEADER

TUSKEGEE, Ala., Nov. 17.—Prominent men from all walks of life, whites as well as negroes, attended the funeral of Booker T. Washington, the noted negro educator, race leader and author, which was held this morning at Tuskegee institute, which he made famous, and which has taken such an important part in the elevation of the negro race.

Fully 8000 persons came to Tuskegee to pay the last tribute of respect to Dr. Washington. Only 2500 could get into the chapel to hear the simple Episcopal burial service and hear the many old plantation songs which Dr. Washington loved so well.

Headed by the board of trustees, a procession including a number of distinguished visitors, members of the faculty and the executive council of the institute, formed in front of the school's administration building and marched to the chapel. The students followed. Burial was in the institute grounds.

CHICAGO, Nov. 17.—Business houses controlled by colored persons were closed for one hour here today during the funeral of Booker T. Washington.

TURKS PREPARE TO WELCOME KAISER

PARIS, Nov. 17.—According to Constantinople advices forwarded by the correspondent of the Havas News agency at Athens, preparations are being made in the Turkish capital to receive the Germans. Numerous houses are said to have been requisitioned as well as the Pera Palace hotel, which is to be occupied by the general staff.

THIEF CONFESSES TO PROTECT GIRL

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Nov. 17.—To shield his sweetheart from a charge of having burglar tools in her possession, Lee Lester, aged 26, of Parkersburg, W. Va., has made a confession to United States District Attorney Stuart R. Bolln, in which he admitted complicity in as many as nine postoffice robberies in Ohio and West Virginia. This was announced today at the district attorney's office.

"I don't care about myself, but the girl is absolutely innocent," Lester is reported to have said in making his confession.

The total loot obtained by Lester was said to be \$2822 in stamps and \$360 in currency.
